SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for SB 265 by Senate Committee on Ways and Means


In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning SB 265 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

SB 265 would make a second or subsequent conviction for a violation of a protection order a severity level 7, person felony. The bill would also make a second or subsequent conviction for a violation of an extended protective order a severity level 4, person felony.

The Kansas Sentencing Commission estimates that enactment of SB 265 could increase prison admissions and the number of beds needed, but that a precise effect cannot be determined at this time. The current estimated available bed capacity is 9,428 for males and 936 for females. Based upon the Commission's most recent ten-year projection contained in its *FY 2023 Adult Inmate Prison Population Projections* report, it is estimated that the year-end population will total 7,933 male and 764 female inmates in FY 2023 and 8,043 male and 740 female inmates in FY 2024.

The Office of Judicial Administration and the Department of Corrections indicate enactment of the bill would not have a fiscal effect. Any fiscal effect associated with SB 265 is not reflected in *The FY 2024 Governor's Budget Report*.
