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22 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 12-1744a is hereby amended to read as follows: 12-1744a. (a) At least seven days prior to the issuance of any revenue bonds, the city or county shall file a statement with the state court *board* of tax appeals of such proposed issuance containing the following information:

(1) The name of the city or county proposing to issue the revenue
bonds, the lessee, the guarantor, if any, the paying or fiscal agent, the
underwriter, if any, and all attorneys retained to render an opinion on the
issue;

32 (2) a legal description of any property to be exempted from ad
33 valorem taxes, including the city or county in which the facility will be
34 located;

35 (3) the appraised valuation of the property to be exempted from ad 36 valorem taxes as shown on the records of the county as of the next 1 preceding January 1. Any listing of property shall not constitute a 2 classification of the property. Classification of any property acquired 3 during the tax exemption period shall be determined at the end of the 4 exemption period in accordance with K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 79-262, and 5 amendments thereto;

6 (4) the estimated total cost of the facility showing a division of such 7 total cost between real and personal property;

8 (5) if the facility to be financed is an addition to or further 9 improvement of an existing facility the cost of which was financed by 10 revenue bonds issued under the provisions of this act, the date of issuance 11 of such revenue bonds, and if such facility or any portion thereof is 12 presently exempt from property taxation, the period for which the same is 13 exempt;

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(6) the principal amount of the revenue bonds to be issued;(7) the amount of any payment to be made in lieu of taxes;

(7) the amount of any payment to be made in lieu of taxes;
(8) an itemized list of service fees or charges to be paid by the lessee
together with a detailed description of the services to be rendered therefor;

(9) a reasonably detailed description of the use of bond proceeds,
including whether they will be used to purchase, acquire, construct,
reconstruct, improve, equip, furnish, enlarge or remodel the facility in
question; and

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(10) the proposed date of issuance of such revenue bonds.

(b) Any change in the information or documents required to be filed
pursuant to subsection (a) which does not materially adversely affect the
security for the revenue bond issue may be made within the fifteen-day
period prior to issuance of the revenue bonds by filing the amended
information or document with the state court board of tax appeals.

(c) Any notice required to be filed pursuant to the provisions of
subsection (a) shall be accompanied by a filing fee, which shall be fixed
by rules and regulations of the state-court *board* of tax appeals, in an
amount sufficient to defray the cost of reviewing the information and
documents required to be contained in the notice.

(d) Information required to be filed by subsection (a) of this section
shall be in addition to any filing required by K.S.A. 79-210, and
amendments thereto.

(e) The state-court board of tax appeals may require any information
listed under subsection (a) deemed necessary, to be filed by a city or
county concerning agreements entered into prior to the effective date of
this act.

40 (f) The state-court *board* of tax appeals shall prepare and compile 41 annually a report containing the information required to be filed pursuant 42 to subsection (a) for each issuance of revenue bonds made pursuant to 43 K.S.A. 12-1740 et seq., and amendments thereto. Such report shall be 1 published in convenient form for the use and information of the 2 legislature, taxpayers, public officers and other interested parties, and shall 3 be available on January 10 of each year.

4 Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 12-4516 is hereby amended to read as 5 follows: 12-4516. (a) (1) Except as provided in subsections (b), (c), (d), (e) 6 and (f), any person who has been convicted of a violation of a city 7 ordinance of this state may petition the convicting court for the 8 expungement of such conviction and related arrest records if three or more 9 years have elapsed since the person:

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Satisfied the sentence imposed; or (A)

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(B) was discharged from probation, parole or a suspended sentence. (2) Except as provided in subsections (b), (c), (d), (e) and (f), any 12 person who has fulfilled the terms of a diversion agreement based on a 13 violation of a city ordinance of this state may petition the court for the 14 expungement of such diversion agreement and related arrest records if 15 16 three or more years have elapsed since the terms of the diversion 17 agreement were fulfilled.

18 (b) Any person convicted of a violation of any ordinance that is 19 prohibited by either-subsection (a) or (b) of K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 12-20 16,134(a) or (b), and amendments thereto, and which was adopted prior to 21 July 1, 2014, or who entered into a diversion agreement in lieu of further 22 criminal proceedings for such violation, may petition the convicting court 23 for the expungement of such conviction or diversion agreement and related 24 arrest records.

25 (c) Any person convicted of the violation of a city ordinance which would also constitute a violation of K.S.A. 21-3512, prior to its repeal, or a 26 27 violation of K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 21-6419, and amendments thereto, or who 28 entered into a diversion agreement in lieu of further criminal proceedings 29 for such violation, may petition the convicting court for the expungement 30 of such conviction or diversion agreement and related arrest records if:

31 (1) One or more years have elapsed since the person satisfied the 32 sentence imposed or the terms of a diversion agreement or was discharged 33 from probation, parole, conditional release or a suspended sentence; and

34 (2) such person can prove they were acting under coercion caused by the act of another. For purposes of this subsection, "coercion" means: 35 36 Threats of harm or physical restraint against any person; a scheme, plan or 37 pattern intended to cause a person to believe that failure to perform an act 38 would result in bodily harm or physical restraint against any person; or the 39 abuse or threatened abuse of the legal process.

40 (d) No person may petition for expungement until five or more years have elapsed since the person satisfied the sentence imposed or the terms 41 of a diversion agreement or was discharged from probation, parole, 42 43 conditional release or a suspended sentence, if such person was convicted 1 of the violation of a city ordinance which would also constitute:

2 (1) Vehicular homicide, as defined by K.S.A. 21-3405, prior to its 3 repeal, or K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 21-5406, and amendments thereto;

(2) driving while the privilege to operate a motor vehicle on the 4 public highways of this state has been canceled, suspended or revoked, as 5 6 prohibited by K.S.A. 8-262, and amendments thereto;

(3) perjury resulting from a violation of K.S.A. 8-261a, and 7 8 amendments thereto:

9 (4) a violation of the provisions of the fifth clause of K.S.A. 8-142, 10 and amendments thereto, relating to fraudulent applications;

(5) any crime punishable as a felony wherein a motor vehicle was 11 used in the perpetration of such crime; 12

(6) failing to stop at the scene of an accident and perform the duties 13 required by K.S.A. 8-1602, 8-1603, prior to its repeal, or 8-1604, and 14 amendments thereto: 15

16 (7) a violation of the provisions of K.S.A. 40-3104, and amendments 17 thereto, relating to motor vehicle liability insurance coverage; or

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(8) a violation of K.S.A. 21-3405b, prior to its repeal.

19 (e) No person may petition for expungement until 10 or more years 20 have elapsed since the person satisfied the sentence imposed or the terms 21 of a diversion agreement or was discharged from probation, parole, 22 conditional release or a suspended sentence, if such person was convicted 23 of the violation of a city ordinance which would also constitute a violation 24 of K.S.A. 8-1567, and amendments thereto.

25 (f) There shall be no expungement of convictions or diversions for a violation of a city ordinance which would also constitute a violation of 26 K.S.A. 8-2,144, and amendments thereto. 27

28 (g) (1) When a petition for expungement is filed, the court shall set a 29 date for a hearing of such petition and shall cause notice of such hearing to be given to the prosecuting attorney and the arresting law enforcement 30 31 agency. The petition shall state the: 32

(A) Defendant's full name:

33 (B) full name of the defendant at the time of arrest, conviction or 34 diversion, if different than the defendant's current name;

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- (C) defendant's sex, race and date of birth;
- 36 (D) crime for which the defendant was arrested, convicted or 37 diverted;

(E) date of the defendant's arrest, conviction or diversion; and

39 (F) identity of the convicting court, arresting law enforcement agency 40 or diverting authority.

41 (2) A municipal court may prescribe a fee to be charged as costs for a person petitioning for an order of expungement pursuant to this section. 42

43 (3) Any person who may have relevant information about the

petitioner may testify at the hearing. The court may inquire into the 1 2 background of the petitioner and shall have access to any reports or 3 records relating to the petitioner that are on file with the secretary of 4 corrections or the prisoner review board.

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(h) At the hearing on the petition, the court shall order the petitioner's 6 arrest record, conviction or diversion expunged if the court finds that:

7 (1) The petitioner has not been convicted of a felony in the past two 8 years and no proceeding involving any such crime is presently pending or 9 being instituted against the petitioner;

10 (2) the circumstances and behavior of the petitioner warrant the 11 expungement; and

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(3) the expungement is consistent with the public welfare.

13 (i) When the court has ordered an arrest record, conviction or diversion expunged, the order of expungement shall state the information 14 required to be contained in the petition. The clerk of the court shall send a 15 16 certified copy of the order of expungement to the Kansas bureau of 17 investigation which shall notify the federal bureau of investigation, the 18 secretary of corrections and any other criminal justice agency which may 19 have a record of the arrest, conviction or diversion. After the order of 20 expungement is entered, the petitioner shall be treated as not having been 21 arrested, convicted or diverted of the crime, except that:

22 (1) Upon conviction for any subsequent crime, the conviction that 23 was expunded may be considered as a prior conviction in determining the 24 sentence to be imposed:

25 (2) the petitioner shall disclose that the arrest, conviction or diversion 26 occurred if asked about previous arrests, convictions or diversions:

27 (A) In any application for employment as a detective with a private 28 detective agency, as defined by K.S.A. 75-7b01, and amendments thereto; 29 as security personnel with a private patrol operator, as defined by K.S.A. 30 75-7b01, and amendments thereto; or with an institution, as defined in 31 K.S.A. 76-12a01, and amendments thereto, of the-department for children 32 and families Kansas department for aging and disability services;

33 (B) in any application for admission, or for an order of reinstatement, 34 to the practice of law in this state;

35 (C) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications for 36 employment with the Kansas lottery or for work in sensitive areas within 37 the Kansas lottery as deemed appropriate by the executive director of the 38 Kansas lottery;

39 (D) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications for executive 40 director of the Kansas racing and gaming commission, for employment with the commission or for work in sensitive areas in parimutuel racing as 41 deemed appropriate by the executive director of the commission, or to aid 42 43 in determining qualifications for licensure or renewal of licensure by the

1 commission;

2 (E) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications for the 3 following under the Kansas expanded lottery act: (i) Lottery gaming 4 facility manager or prospective manager, racetrack gaming facility 5 manager or prospective manager, licensee or certificate holder; or (ii) an 6 officer, director, employee, owner, agent or contractor thereof;

7 (F) upon application for a commercial driver's license under K.S.A. 8-2,125 through 8-2,142, and amendments thereto;

9 (G) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications to be an 10 employee of the state gaming agency;

(H) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications to be an
employee of a tribal gaming commission or to hold a license issued
pursuant to a tribal-state gaming compact;

(I) in any application for registration as a broker-dealer, agent,
investment adviser or investment adviser representative all as defined in
K.S.A. 17-12a102, and amendments thereto;

(J) in any application for employment as a law enforcement officer, as
 defined in K.S.A. 22-2202 or 74-5602, and amendments thereto; or

(K) for applications received on and after July 1, 2006, to aid in
determining the petitioner's qualifications for a license to carry a concealed
weapon pursuant to the personal and family protection act, K.S.A. 2014
Supp. 75-7c01 et seq., and amendments thereto;

(3) the court, in the order of expungement, may specify other
 circumstances under which the arrest, conviction or diversion is to be
 disclosed; and

(4) the conviction may be disclosed in a subsequent prosecution for
an offense which requires as an element of such offense a prior conviction
of the type expunged.

(j) Whenever a person is convicted of an ordinance violation, pleads
guilty and pays a fine for such a violation, is placed on parole or probation
or is granted a suspended sentence for such a violation, the person shall be
informed of the ability to expunge the arrest records or conviction.
Whenever a person enters into a diversion agreement, the person shall be
informed of the ability to expunge the diversion.

(k) Subject to the disclosures required pursuant to subsection (i), in any application for employment, license or other civil right or privilege, or any appearance as a witness, a person whose arrest records, conviction or diversion of an offense has been expunged under this statute may state that such person has never been arrested, convicted or diverted of such offense.

(1) Whenever the record of any arrest, conviction or diversion has
been expunged under the provisions of this section or under the provisions
of any other existing or former statute, the custodian of the records of
arrest, conviction, diversion and incarceration relating to that crime shall

1 not disclose the existence of such records, except when requested by:

(1) The person whose record was expunged;

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3 (2) a private detective agency or a private patrol operator, and the 4 request is accompanied by a statement that the request is being made in 5 conjunction with an application for employment with such agency or 6 operator by the person whose record has been expunged;

7 (3) a court, upon a showing of a subsequent conviction of the person 8 whose record has been expunged;

9 (4) the secretary of the department for-children and families aging 10 and disability services, or a designee of the secretary, for the purpose of 11 obtaining information relating to employment in an institution, as defined 12 in K.S.A. 76-12a01, and amendments thereto, of the department for-13 children and families Kansas department for aging and disability services 14 of any person whose record has been expunged;

15 (5) a person entitled to such information pursuant to the terms of the 16 expungement order;

(6) a prosecuting attorney, and such request is accompanied by a
statement that the request is being made in conjunction with a prosecution
of an offense that requires a prior conviction as one of the elements of such
offense;

(7) the supreme court, the clerk or disciplinary administrator thereof, the state board for admission of attorneys or the state board for discipline of attorneys, and the request is accompanied by a statement that the request is being made in conjunction with an application for admission, or for an order of reinstatement, to the practice of law in this state by the person whose record has been expunged;

(8) the Kansas lottery, and the request is accompanied by a statement
that the request is being made to aid in determining qualifications for
employment with the Kansas lottery or for work in sensitive areas within
the Kansas lottery as deemed appropriate by the executive director of the
Kansas lottery;

(9) the governor or the Kansas racing and gaming commission, or a designee of the commission, and the request is accompanied by a statement that the request is being made to aid in determining qualifications for executive director of the commission, for employment with the commission, for work in sensitive areas in parimutuel racing as deemed appropriate by the executive director of the commission or for licensure, renewal of licensure or continued licensure by the commission;

(10) the Kansas racing and gaming commission, or a designee of the
commission, and the request is accompanied by a statement that the
request is being made to aid in determining qualifications of the following
under the Kansas expanded lottery act: (A) Lottery gaming facility
managers and prospective managers, racetrack gaming facility managers

and prospective managers, licensees and certificate holders; and (B) their
 officers, directors, employees, owners, agents and contractors;

(11) the state gaming agency, and the request is accompanied by a
statement that the request is being made to aid in determining
qualifications: (A) To be an employee of the state gaming agency; or (B)
to be an employee of a tribal gaming commission or to hold a license
issued pursuant to a tribal-state gaming compact;

8 (12) the Kansas securities commissioner, or a designee of the 9 commissioner, and the request is accompanied by a statement that the 10 request is being made in conjunction with an application for registration as 11 a broker-dealer, agent, investment adviser or investment adviser 12 representative by such agency and the application was submitted by the 13 person whose record has been expunged;

14 (13) the attorney general, and the request is accompanied by a 15 statement that the request is being made to aid in determining 16 qualifications for a license to carry a concealed weapon pursuant to the 17 personal and family protection act;

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(14) the Kansas sentencing commission;

(15) the Kansas commission on peace officers' standards and training
and the request is accompanied by a statement that the request is being
made to aid in determining certification eligibility as a law enforcement
officer pursuant to K.S.A. 74-5601 et seq., and amendments thereto; or

(16) a law enforcement agency and the request is accompanied by a
statement that the request is being made to aid in determining eligibility
for employment as a law enforcement officer as defined by K.S.A. 222202, and amendments thereto.

27 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 12-4516a is hereby amended to read as 28 follows: 12-4516a.(a) Any person who has been arrested on a violation of 29 a city ordinance of this state may petition the court for the expungement of 30 such arrest record.

31 (b) When a petition for expungement is filed, the court shall set a date 32 for hearing on such petition and shall cause notice of such hearing to be 33 given to the prosecuting attorney and the arresting law enforcement agency. When a petition for expungement is filed, the official court file 34 shall be separated from the other records of the court, and shall be 35 36 disclosed only to a judge of the court and members of the staff of the court 37 designated by a judge of the district court, the prosecuting attorney, the 38 arresting law enforcement agency, or any other person when authorized by 39 a court order, subject to any conditions imposed by the order. The petition 40 shall state:

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(1) The petitioner's full name;

42 (2) the full name of the petitioner at the time of arrest, if different43 than the petitioner's current name;

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- (3) the petitioner's sex, race and date of birth;
- (4) the crime for which the petitioner was arrested;
- 3 (5) the date of the petitioner's arrest; and
  - (6) the identity of the arresting law enforcement agency.

A municipal court may prescribe a fee to be charged as costs for a person petitioning for an order of expungement pursuant to this section, except that no fee shall be charged to a person who was arrested as a result of being a victim of identity theft under K.S.A. 21-4018, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 21-6107, and amendments thereto. Any person who may have relevant information about the petitioner may testify at the hearing. The court may inquire into the background of the petitioner.

(c) At the hearing on a petition for expungement, the court shall order
 the arrest record and subsequent court proceedings, if any, expunged upon
 finding:

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The arrest occurred because of mistaken identity;
 a court has found that there was no probable cause for the arrest;

16 17 (2) a court has found that there was no probable cause for the a(3) the petitioner was found not guilty in court proceedings;

(4) the arrest was for a violation of any ordinance that is prohibited
by either subsection (a) or (b) of K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 12-16,134(a) or (b),
and amendments thereto, and which was adopted prior to July 1, 2014; or

(5) the expungement would be in the best interests of justice and: (A)
Charges have been dismissed; or (B) no charges have been or are likely to
be filed.

24 (d) When the court has ordered expungement of an arrest record and 25 subsequent court proceedings, if any, the order shall state the information required to be stated in the petition and shall state the grounds for 26 27 expungement under subsection (c). The clerk of the court shall send a 28 certified copy of the order to the Kansas bureau of investigation which 29 shall notify the federal bureau of investigation, the secretary of corrections 30 and any other criminal justice agency which may have a record of the 31 arrest. If an order of expungement is entered, the petitioner shall be treated 32 as not having been arrested.

(e) If the ground for expungement is as provided in subsection (c)(5),
the court shall determine whether, in the interest of public welfare, the
records should be available for any of the following purposes:

(1) In any application for employment as a detective with a private
detective agency, as defined by K.S.A. 75-7b01, and amendments thereto;
as security personnel with a private patrol operator, as defined by K.S.A.
75-7b01, and amendments thereto; or with an institution, as defined in
K.S.A. 76-12a01, and amendments thereto, of the department of social and
rehabilitation Kansas department for aging and disability services;

42 (2) in any application for admission, or for an order of reinstatement,43 to the practice of law in this state;

1 (3) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications for 2 employment with the Kansas lottery or for work in sensitive areas within 3 the Kansas lottery as deemed appropriate by the executive director of the 4 Kansas lottery;

5 (4) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications for executive 6 director of the Kansas racing commission, for employment with the 7 commission or for work in sensitive areas in parimutuel racing as deemed 8 appropriate by the executive director of the commission, or to aid in 9 determining qualifications for licensure or renewal of licensure by the 10 commission;

(5) in any application for a commercial driver's license under K.S.A.
8-2,125 through 8-2,142, and amendments thereto;

(6) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications to be anemployee of the state gaming agency;

15 (7) to aid in determining the petitioner's qualifications to be an 16 employee of a tribal gaming commission or to hold a license issued 17 pursuant to a tribal-state gaming compact; or

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(8) in any other circumstances which the court deems appropriate.

(f) The court shall make all expunged records and related information
in such court's possession, created prior to, on and after July 1, 2011,
available to the Kansas bureau of investigation for the purposes of:

(1) Completing a person's criminal history record information within
 the central repository in accordance with K.S.A. 22-4701 et seq., and
 amendments thereto; or

(2) providing information or documentation to the federal bureau of
 investigation, in connection with the national instant criminal background
 check system, to determine a person's qualification to possess a firearm.

(g) Subject to any disclosures required under subsection (e), in any application for employment, license or other civil right or privilege, or any appearance as a witness, a person whose arrest records have been expunged as provided in this section may state that such person has never been arrested.

(h) Whenever a petitioner's arrest records have been expunged as provided in this section, the custodian of the records of arrest, incarceration due to arrest or court proceedings related to the arrest, shall not disclose the arrest or any information related to the arrest, except as directed by the order of expungement or when requested by the person whose arrest record was expunged.

Sec. 4. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 17-7673 is hereby amended to read as
follows: 17-7673. (a) In order to form a limited liability company, one or
more authorized persons must execute articles of organization. The articles
of organization shall be filed with the secretary of state and set forth:

43 (1) The name of the limited liability company;

1 (2) the address of the registered office and the name and address of 2 the resident agent for service of process required to be maintained by 3 K.S.A.<u>17-7666</u> 2014 Supp. 17-7924 and 17-7925, and amendments 4 thereto;

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(3) any other matters the members determine to include therein;

6 (4) if the limited liability company is organized to exercise the 7 powers of a professional association or professional corporation, each such 8 profession shall be stated; and

9 (5) if the limited liability company will have series, the matters 10 required by K.S.A. 17-76,143, and amendments thereto.

(b) A limited liability company is formed at the time of the filing of 11 the initial articles of organization with the secretary of state or at any later 12 date or time specified in the articles of organization which is not later than 13 90 days after the date of filing, if, in either case, there has been substantial 14 eompliance with the requirements of this section. A limited liability 15 16 company formed under this act shall be a separate legal entity, the existence of which as a separate legal entity shall continue until 17 cancellation of the limited liability company's articles of organization. 18

(c) An operating agreement shall be entered into or otherwise existing either before, after or at the time of the filing of the articles of organization and, whether entered into or otherwise existing before, after or at the time of such filing, may be made effective as of the effective time of such filing or at such other time or date as provided in or reflected by the operating agreement.

(d) The articles of organization shall be amended as provided in a
certificate of amendment or judicial decree of amendment upon the filing
of the certificate of amendment or judicial decree of amendment with the
secretary of state or upon the future effective date specified in the
certificate of amendment.

(e) Upon filing the articles of organization of a limited liability
company organized to exercise powers of a professional association or
professional corporation, the limited liability company shall file with the
secretary of state a certificate by the licensing body, as defined in K.S.A.
74–146, and amendments thereto, of the profession involved that each of
the members is duly licensed to practice that profession, and that the
proposed company name has been approved.

Sec. 5. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 17-7674 is hereby amended to read as
follows: 17-7674. (a) Articles of organization are amended by filing a
certificate of amendment thereto with the secretary of state. The certificate

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(2) otherwise meets admission criteria of the camp.

If the inmate successfully completes a conservation camp program, the secretary of corrections shall report such completion to the sentencing court and the county or district attorney. The inmate shall then be assigned by the court to six months of follow-up supervision conducted by the appropriate community corrections services program. 7 (I) any individual, or public or private agency authorized by a 8 properly constituted authority to diagnose, care for, treat or supervise a juvenile who is the subject of a report or record of child abuse or neglect, 9 specifically including the following: Physicians, psychiatrists, nurses, 10 nurse practitioners, psychologists, licensed social workers, child 11 development specialists, physicians' physician assistants, community 12 mental health workers, alcohol and drug abuse counselors and licensed or 13 registered child care providers; 14

(J) a citizen review board pursuant to K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 38-2207,
and amendments thereto;

17 (K) an educational institution to the extent necessary to enable such 18 institution to provide the safest possible environment for pupils and 19 employees of the institution;

20 (L) any educator to the extent necessary for the protection of the 21 educator and pupils; and

(M) any juvenile intake and assessment worker of another certifiedjuvenile intake and assessment program.

Sec. 10. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 39-709, as amended by section 9 of 2015 House Bill No. 2258, is hereby amended to read as follows: 39-709. (a) *General eligibility requirements for assistance for which federal moneys are expended*. Subject to the additional requirements below, assistance in accordance with plans under which federal moneys are expended may be granted to any needy person who:

(1) Has insufficient income or resources to provide a reasonable 30 31 subsistence compatible with decency and health. Where a husband and 32 wife or cohabiting partners are living together, the combined income or resources of both shall be considered in determining the eligibility of 33 34 either or both for such assistance unless otherwise prohibited by law. The 35 secretary, in determining need of any applicant for or recipient of 36 assistance shall not take into account the financial responsibility of any 37 individual for any applicant or recipient of assistance unless such applicant 38 or recipient is such individual's spouse, cohabiting partner or such 39 individual's minor child or minor stepchild if the stepchild is living with 40 such individual. The secretary in determining need of an individual may provide such income and resource exemptions as may be permitted by 41 federal law. For purposes of eligibility for temporary assistance for needy 42 43 families, for food assistance and for any other assistance provided through

the Kansas department for children and families under which federal 1 2 moneys are expended, the secretary for children and families shall 3 consider one motor vehicle owned by the applicant for assistance, 4 regardless of the value of such vehicle, as exempt personal property and 5 shall consider any equity in any boat, personal water craft, recreational 6 vehicle, recreational off-highway vehicle or all-terrain vehicle, as defined 7 by K.S.A. 8-126, and amendments thereto, or any additional motor vehicle 8 owned by the applicant for assistance to be a nonexempt resource of the 9 applicant for assistance except that any additional motor vehicle used by 10 the applicant, the applicant's spouse or the applicant's cohabiting partner for the primary purpose of earning income may be considered as exempt 11 12 personal property in the secretary's discretion.

(2) Is a citizen of the United States or is an alien lawfully admitted tothe United States and who is residing in the state of Kansas.

15 Temporary assistance for needy families. Assistance may be (b) granted under this act to any dependent child, or relative, subject to the 16 17 general eligibility requirements as set out in subsection (a), who resides in 18 the state of Kansas or whose parent or other relative with whom the child 19 is living resides in the state of Kansas. Such assistance shall be known as 20 temporary assistance for needy families. On and after January 1, 2017, the 21 department shall conduct an electronic check for any false information 22 provided on an application for TANF and other benefits programs 23 administered by the department. Where the husband and wife or 24 cohabiting partners are living together, both shall register for work under 25 the program requirements for temporary assistance for needy families in 26 accordance with criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations 27 of the secretary.

28 (1) As used in this subsection, "family group" or "household" means 29 the applicant or recipient for TANF, child care subsidy or employment 30 services and all individuals living together in which there is a relationship 31 of legal responsibility or a qualifying caretaker relationship. This will 32 include a cohabiting boyfriend or girlfriend living with the person legally 33 responsible for the child. The family group shall not be eligible for TANF 34 if the family group contains at least one adult member who has received 35 TANF, including the federal TANF assistance received in any other state, 36 for 36 calendar months beginning on and after October 1, 1996, unless the 37 secretary determines a hardship exists and grants an extension allowing 38 receipt of TANF until the 48-month limit is reached. No extension beyond 39 48 months shall be granted. Hardship provisions for a recipient include:

40 (A) Is a caretaker of a disabled family member living in the 41 household;

42 (B) has a disability which precludes employment on a long-term basis43 or requires substantial rehabilitation;

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1 (C) needs a time limit extension to overcome the effects of domestic 2 violence/sexual assault;

3 (D) is involved with prevention and protection services (PPS) and has 4 an open social service plan; or

5 (E) is determined by the 36<sup>th</sup> month to have an extreme hardship other
6 than what is designated in criteria listed in subparagraphs (A) through (E).
7 This determination will be made by the executive review team.

8 (2) All adults applying for TANF shall be required to complete a 9 work program assessment as specified by the Kansas department for children and families, including those who have been disqualified for or 10 denied TANF due to non-cooperation, drug testing requirements or fraud. 11 12 Adults who are not otherwise eligible for TANF, such as ineligible aliens, relative/non-relative caretakers and adults receiving supplemental security 13 14 income are not required to complete the assessment process. During the 15 application processing period, applicants must complete at least one 16 module or its equivalent of the work program assessment to be considered 17 eligible for TANF benefits, unless good cause is found to be exempt from 18 the requirements. Good cause exemptions shall only include:

(A) The applicant can document an existing certification verifyingcompletion of the work program assessment;

(B) the applicant has a valid offer of employment or is employed a
 minimum of 20 hours a week;

(C) the applicant is a parenting teen without a GED or high schooldiploma;

25 26 (D) the applicant is enrolled in job corps;

(E) the applicant is working with a refugee social services agency; or

(F) the applicant has completed the work program assessment withinthe last 12 months.

(3) The department for children and families shall maintain a
sufficient level of dedicated work program staff to enable the agency to
conduct work program case management services to TANF recipients in a
timely manner and in full accordance with state law and agency policy.

33 (4) TANF mandatory work program applicants and recipients shall 34 participate in work components that lead to competitive, integrated 35 employment. Components are defined by the federal government as being either primary or secondary. In order to meet federal work participation 36 37 requirements, households need to meet at least 30 hours of participation 38 per week, at least 20 hours of which need to be primary and at least 10 39 hours may be secondary components in one parent households where the youngest child is six years of age or older. Participation hours shall be 55 40 41 hours in two parent households (35 hours per week if child care is not used). The maximum assignment is 40 hours per week per individual. For 42 43 two parent families to meet the federal work participation rate both parents

must participate in a combined total of 55 hours per week, 50 hours of 1 2 which must be in primary components, or one or both parents could be 3 assigned a combined total of 35 hours per week (30 hours of which must 4 be primary components) if department for children and families paid child 5 care is not received by the family. Single parent families with a child under 6 age six meet the federal participation requirement if the parent is engaged 7 in work or work activities for at least 20 hours per week in a primary work 8 component. The following components meet federal definitions of primary 9 hours of participation: Full or part-time employment, apprenticeship, work 10 study, self-employment, job corps, subsidized employment, work experience sites, on-the-job training, supervised community service, 11 12 vocational education, job search and job readiness. Secondary components include: Job skills training, education directly related to employment such 13 14 as adult basic education and English as a second language, and completion 15 of a high school diploma or GED.

16 (5) A parent or other adult caretaker personally providing care for a child under the age of three months in their TANF household is exempt 17 18 from work participation activities until the month the child turns three months of age. Such three-month limitation shall not apply to a parent or 19 20 other adult caretaker who is personally providing care for a child born 21 significantly premature, with serious medical conditions or with a 22 disability as defined by the secretary, in consultation with the secretary of 23 health and environment, and adopted in the rules and regulations. The 24 three-month period is defined as two consecutive months starting with the 25 month after childbirth. The exemption for caring for a child under three 26 months cannot be claimed:

(A) By either parent when two parents are in the home and thehousehold meets the two-parent definition for federal reporting purposes;

(B) by one parent or caretaker when the other parent or caretaker is in
the home, and available, capable and suitable to provide care and the
household does not meet the two-parent definition for federal reporting
purposes;

(C) by a person age 19 or younger when such person is pregnant or a
parent of a child in the home and the person does not possess a high school
diploma or its equivalent. Such person shall become exempt the month
such person turns age 20;

(D) by any adult in the TANF assistance plan when at least one adulthas reached the 36 months of TANF cash assistance; or

39 (E) by any person assigned to a work participation activity for 40 substance use disorders.

41 (6) TANF work experience placements shall be reviewed after 90
42 days and are limited to six months per 48-month lifetime limit. A client's
43 progress shall be reviewed prior to each new placement regardless of the

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1 length of time they are at the work experience site.

2 (7) TANF participants with disabilities shall engage in required employment activities to the maximum extent consistent with their 3 4 abilities. TANF participants shall provide current documentation by a 5 qualified medical practitioner that details the abilities to engage in 6 employment and any limitations in work activities along with the expected 7 duration of such limitations. Disability is defined as a physical or mental 8 impairment constituting or resulting in a substantial impediment to 9 employment for such individual.

10 (8) Non-cooperation is the failure of the applicant or recipient to 11 comply with all requirements provided in state and federal law, federal and 12 state rules and regulations and agency policy. The period of ineligibility 13 for TANF benefits based on non-cooperation with work programs shall be 14 as follows:

(A) For a first penalty, three months and full cooperation with workprogram activities;

(B) for a second penalty, six months and full cooperation with workprogram activities;

(C) for a third penalty, one year and full cooperation with workprogram activities; and

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(D) for a fourth or subsequent penalty, 10 years.

(9) Individuals that have not cooperated with TANF work programs shall be ineligible to participate in the food assistance program. The comparable penalty shall be applied to only the individual in the food assistance program who failed to comply with the TANF work requirement. The agency shall impose the same penalty to the member of the household who failed to comply with TANF requirements. The penalty periods are three months, six months, one year, or 10 years.

(10) Non-cooperation is the failure of the applicant or recipient to
comply with all requirements provided in state and federal law, federal and
state rules and regulations and agency policy. The period of ineligibility
for child care subsidy or TANF benefits based on parents' non-cooperation
with child support services shall be as follows:

34 (A) For the first penalty, three months and cooperation with child35 support services prior to regaining eligibility;

(B) for a second penalty, six months and cooperation with child
 support services prior to regaining eligibility;

38 (C) for a third penalty, one year and cooperation with child support39 services prior to regaining eligibility; and

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(D) for a fourth penalty, 10 years.

41 (11) Individuals that have not cooperated without good cause with 42 child support services shall be ineligible to participate in the food 43 assistance program. The period of disqualification ends once it has been 1 determined that such individual is cooperating with child support services.

2 Any individual who is found to have committed fraud or is (12)3 found guilty of the crime of theft pursuant to K.S.A. 39-720 and K.S.A. 4 2014 Supp. 21-5801, and amendments thereto, in either the TANF or child 5 care program shall render all adults in the family unit ineligible for TANF 6 assistance. Adults in the household who were determined to have 7 committed fraud or were convicted of the crime of theft pursuant to K.S.A. 8 39-720 and K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 21-5801, and amendments thereto, shall 9 render themselves and all adult household members ineligible for their lifetime for TANF, even if fraud was committed in only one program. 10 Households who have been determined to have committed fraud or were 11 12 convicted of the crime of theft pursuant to K.S.A. 39-720 and K.S.A. 2014 13 Supp. 21-5801, and amendments thereto, shall be required to name a 14 protective payee as approved by the secretary or the secretary's designee to 15 administer TANF benefits or food assistance on behalf of the children. No 16 adult in a household may have access to the TANF cash assistance benefit.

17 (13) (A) Food assistance shall not be provided to any person convicted of a felony offense occurring on or after July 1, 2015, which 18 19 includes as an element of such offense the manufacture, cultivation, 20 distribution, possession or use of a controlled substance or controlled 21 substance analog. For food assistance, the individual shall be permanently 22 disgualified if they have been convicted of a state or federal felony offense 23 occurring on or after July 1, 2015, involving possession or use of a 24 controlled substance or controlled substance analog.

(B) Notwithstanding the provisions of subparagraph (A), an
individual shall be eligible for food assistance if the individual enrolls in
and participates in a drug treatment program approved by the secretary,
submits to and passes a drug test and agrees to submit to drug testing if
requested by the department pursuant to a drug testing plan.

An individual's failure to submit to testing or failure to successfully pass a drug test shall result in ineligibility for food assistance until a drug test is successfully passed. Failure to successfully complete a drug treatment program shall result in ineligibility for food assistance until a drug treatment plan approved by the secretary is successfully completed, the individual passes a drug test and agrees to submit to drug testing if requested by the department pursuant to a drug testing plan.

37 (C) The provisions of subparagraph (B) shall not apply to any
38 individual who has been convicted for a second or subsequent felony
39 offense as provided in subparagraph (A).

40 (14) No TANF cash assistance shall be used to purchase alcohol,
41 cigarettes, tobacco products, lottery tickets, concert tickets, professional or
42 collegiate sporting event tickets or tickets for other entertainment events
43 intended for the general public or sexually oriented adult materials. No

1 TANF cash assistance shall be used in any retail liquor store, casino, 2 gaming establishment, jewelry store, tattoo parlor, massage parlor, body 3 piercing parlor, spa, nail salon, lingerie shop, tobacco paraphernalia store, 4 vapor cigarette store, psychic or fortune telling business, bail bond 5 company, video arcade, movie theater, swimming pool, cruise ship, theme 6 park, dog or horse racing facility, parimutuel facility, or sexually oriented 7 business or any retail establishment which provides adult-oriented 8 entertainment in which performers disrobe or perform in an unclothed 9 state for entertainment, or in any business or retail establishment where minors under age 18 are not permitted. TANF cash assistance transactions 10 for cash withdrawals from automated teller machines shall be limited to 11 \$25, per transaction and to one transaction per day. No TANF cash 12 13 assistance shall be used for purchases at points of sale outside the state of 14 Kansas

15 (15) (A) The secretary for children and families shall place a 16 photograph of the recipient, if agreed to by such recipient of public 17 assistance, on any Kansas benefits card issued by the Kansas department 18 for children and families that the recipient uses in obtaining food, cash or 19 any other services. When a recipient of public assistance is a minor or otherwise incapacitated individual, a parent or legal guardian of such 20 21 recipient may have a photograph of such parent or legal guardian placed 22 on the card.

(B) Any Kansas benefits card with a photograph of a recipient shall
 be valid for voting purposes as a public assistance identification card in
 accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 25-2908, and amendments
 thereto.

(C) As used in this paragraph and its subparagraphs, "Kansas benefits
card" means any card issued to provide food assistance, cash assistance or
child care assistance, including, but not limited to, the vision card, EBT
card and Kansas benefits card.

31 (16) The secretary for children and families shall adopt rules and 32 regulations:

(A) In determining eligibility for the child care subsidy program,
 including an income of a cohabiting partner in a child care household; and

(B) in determining and maintaining eligibility for non-TANF child
care, requiring that all included adults shall be employed a minimum of 20
hours per week or more as defined by the secretary or meet the following
specific qualifying exemptions:

39 (i) Adults who are not capable of meeting the requirement due to a40 documented physical or mental condition;

(ii) adults who are former TANF recipients who need child care for
employment after their TANF case has closed and earned income is a
factor in the closure in the two months immediately following TANF

1 closure;

2 (iii) adult parents included in a case in which the only child receiving
3 benefits is the child of a minor parent who is working on completion of
4 high school or obtaining a GED; or

5 (iv) adults who are participants in a mandatory food assistance 6 education and training program.

7 The department for children and families shall provide child care for 8 the pursuit of any degree or certification if the occupation has at least an 9 average job outlook listed in the occupational outlook of the U.S. 10 department of labor, bureau of labor statistics. For occupations with less 11 than an average job outlook, educational plans shall require approval of 12 the secretary or secretary's designee. Child care may also be approved if the student provides verification of a specific job offer that will be 13 14 available to such student upon completion of the program. Child care for 15 post-secondary education shall be allowed for a lifetime maximum of 24 16 months per adult. The 24 months may not have to be consecutive. Students 17 shall be engaged in paid employment for a minimum of 15 hours per 18 week. In a two-parent adult household, child care would not be allowed if 19 both parents are adults and attending a formal education or training program at the same time. The household may choose which one of the 20 21 parents is participating as a post-secondary student. The other parent shall 22 meet another approvable criteria for child care subsidy.

23 (17)The secretary for children and families is prohibited from 24 requesting or implementing a waiver or program from the U.S. department 25 of agriculture for the time limited assistance provisions for able-bodied 26 adults aged 18 through 49 without dependents in a household under the 27 food assistance program. The time on food assistance for able-bodied 28 adults aged 18 through 49 without dependents in the household shall be 29 limited to three months in a 36-month period if such adults are not meeting 30 the requirements imposed by the U.S. department of agriculture that they 31 must work for at least 20 hours per week or participate in a federally 32 approved work program or its equivalent.

(18) Eligibility for the food assistance program shall be limited to 33 34 those individuals who are citizens or who meet qualified non-citizen status 35 as determined by U.S. department of agriculture. Non-citizen individuals 36 who are unable or unwilling to provide qualifying immigrant 37 documentation, as defined by the U.S. department of agriculture, residing 38 within a household shall not be included when determining the household's 39 size for the purposes of assigning a benefit level to the household for food 40 assistance or comparing the household's monthly income with the income 41 eligibility standards. The gross non-exempt earned and unearned income 42 and resources of disqualified individuals shall be counted in its entirety as 43 available to the remaining household members.

1 (19) The secretary for children and families shall not enact the state 2 option from the U.S. department of agriculture for broad-based categorical 3 eligibility for households applying for food assistance according to the 4 provisions of 7 C.F.R. § 273.2(j)(2)(ii).

5 (20) No federal or state funds shall be used for television, radio or 6 billboard advertisements that are designed to promote food assistance 7 benefits and enrollment. No federal or state funding shall be used for any 8 agreements with foreign governments designed to promote food 9 assistance.

(21) (A) The secretary for children and families shall not apply gross
income standards for food assistance higher than the standards specified in
7 U.S.C. § 2014(c) unless expressly required by federal law. Categorical
eligibility exempting households from such gross income standards
requirements shall not be granted for any non-cash, in-kind or other
benefit unless expressly required by federal law.

16 (B) The secretary for children and families shall not apply resource 17 limits standards for food assistance that are higher than the standards 18 specified in 7 U.S.C. § 2014(g)(1) unless expressly required by federal 19 law. Categorical eligibility exempting households from such resource 20 limits shall not be granted for any non-cash, in-kind or other benefit unless 21 expressly required by federal law.

22 (c) Temporary assistance for needy families; assignment of support rights and limited power of attorney. By applying for or receiving 23 24 temporary assistance for needy families such applicant or recipient shall be 25 deemed to have assigned to the secretary on behalf of the state any 26 accrued, present or future rights to support from any other person such 27 applicant may have in such person's own behalf or in behalf of any other 28 family member for whom the applicant is applying for or receiving aid. In 29 any case in which an order for child support has been established and the 30 legal custodian and obligee under the order surrenders physical custody of 31 the child to a caretaker relative without obtaining a modification of legal 32 custody and support rights on behalf of the child are assigned pursuant to 33 this section, the surrender of physical custody and the assignment shall 34 transfer, by operation of law, the child's support rights under the order to 35 the secretary on behalf of the state. Such assignment shall be of all 36 accrued, present or future rights to support of the child surrendered to the 37 caretaker relative. The assignment of support rights shall automatically 38 become effective upon the date of approval for or receipt of such aid 39 without the requirement that any document be signed by the applicant, 40 recipient or obligee. By applying for or receiving temporary assistance for 41 needy families, or by surrendering physical custody of a child to a 42 caretaker relative who is an applicant or recipient of such assistance on the 43 child's behalf, the applicant, recipient or obligee is also deemed to have

1 appointed the secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney-in-fact 2 to perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, 3 money orders or other negotiable instruments representing support 4 payments received by the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, 5 receiving or having received such assistance. This limited power of 6 attorney shall be effective from the date the secretary approves the 7 application for aid and shall remain in effect until the assignment of 8 support rights has been terminated in full.

9 (d) Requirements for medical assistance for which federal moneys or 10 state moneys or both are expended. (1) When the secretary has adopted a medical care plan under which federal moneys or state moneys or both are 11 12 expended, medical assistance in accordance with such plan shall be 13 granted to any person who is a citizen of the United States or who is an alien lawfully admitted to the United States and who is residing in the state 14 15 of Kansas, whose resources and income do not exceed the levels 16 prescribed by the secretary. In determining the need of an individual, the 17 secretary may provide for income and resource exemptions and protected 18 income and resource levels. Resources from inheritance shall be counted. 19 A disclaimer of an inheritance pursuant to K.S.A. 59-2291, and 20 amendments thereto, shall constitute a transfer of resources. The secretary 21 shall exempt principal and interest held in irrevocable trust pursuant to 22 K.S.A. 16-303(c), and amendments thereto, from the eligibility 23 requirements of applicants for and recipients of medical assistance. Such 24 assistance shall be known as medical assistance.

25 (2) For the purposes of medical assistance eligibility determinations on or after July 1, 2004, if an applicant or recipient owns property in joint 26 27 tenancy with some other party and the applicant or recipient of medical 28 assistance has restricted or conditioned their interest in such property to a 29 specific and discrete property interest less than 100%, then such designation will cause the full value of the property to be considered an 30 31 available resource to the applicant or recipient. Medical assistance eligibility for receipt of benefits under the title XIX of the social security 32 33 act, commonly known as medicaid, shall not be expanded, as provided for 34 in the patient protection and affordable care act, public law 111-148, 124 35 stat. 119, and the health care and education reconciliation act of 2010, 36 public law 111-152, 124 stat. 1029, unless the legislature expressly 37 consents to, and approves of, the expansion of medicaid services by an act 38 of the legislature.

(3) (A) Resources from trusts shall be considered when determining
eligibility of a trust beneficiary for medical assistance. Medical assistance
is to be secondary to all resources, including trusts, that may be available
to an applicant or recipient of medical assistance.

43 (B) If a trust has discretionary language, the trust shall be considered

1 to be an available resource to the extent, using the full extent of discretion,

2 the trustee may make any of the income or principal available to the 3 applicant or recipient of medical assistance. Any such discretionary trust 4 shall be considered an available resource unless: (i) At the time of creation 5 or amendment of the trust, the trust states a clear intent that the trust is 6 supplemental to public assistance; and (ii) the trust: (a) Is funded from 7 resources of a person who, at the time of such funding, owed no duty of 8 support to the applicant or recipient of medical assistance; or (b) is funded 9 not more than nominally from resources of a person while that person 10 owed a duty of support to the applicant or recipient of medical assistance.

(C) For the purposes of this paragraph, "public assistance" includes,
but is not limited to, medicaid, medical assistance or title XIX of the social
security act.

14 (4) (A) When an applicant or recipient of medical assistance is a party 15 to a contract, agreement or accord for personal services being provided by 16 a nonlicensed individual or provider and such contract, agreement or 17 accord involves health and welfare monitoring, pharmacy assistance, case management, communication with medical, health or other professionals, 18 19 or other activities related to home health care, long term care, medical 20 assistance benefits, or other related issues, any moneys paid under such 21 contract, agreement or accord shall be considered to be an available 22 resource unless the following restrictions are met: (i) The contract, 23 agreement or accord must be in writing and executed prior to any services 24 being provided; (ii) the moneys paid are in direct relationship with the fair 25 market value of such services being provided by similarly situated and 26 trained nonlicensed individuals; (iii) if no similarly situated nonlicensed 27 individuals or situations can be found, the value of services will be based 28 on federal hourly minimum wage standards; (iv) such individual providing 29 the services will report all receipts of moneys as income to the appropriate 30 state and federal governmental revenue agencies; (v) any amounts due 31 under such contract, agreement or accord shall be paid after the services 32 are rendered; (vi) the applicant or recipient shall have the power to revoke 33 the contract, agreement or accord; and (vii) upon the death of the applicant 34 or recipient, the contract, agreement or accord ceases.

35 (B) When an applicant or recipient of medical assistance is a party to 36 a written contract for personal services being provided by a licensed health 37 professional or facility and such contract involves health and welfare 38 monitoring, pharmacy assistance, case management, communication with 39 medical, health or other professionals, or other activities related to home 40 health care, long term care, medical assistance benefits or other related 41 issues, any moneys paid in advance of receipt of services for such 42 contracts shall be considered to be an available resource.

43 (5) Any trust may be amended if such amendment is permitted by the

1 Kansas uniform trust code.

2 (e) Eligibility for medical assistance of resident receiving medical 3 care outside state. A person who is receiving medical care including long-4 term care outside of Kansas whose health would be endangered by the 5 postponement of medical care until return to the state or by travel to return 6 to Kansas, may be determined eligible for medical assistance if such 7 individual is a resident of Kansas and all other eligibility factors are met. 8 Persons who are receiving medical care on an ongoing basis in a long-term 9 medical care facility in a state other than Kansas and who do not return to 10 a care facility in Kansas when they are able to do so, shall no longer be 11 eligible to receive assistance in Kansas unless such medical care is not 12 available in a comparable facility or program providing such medical care 13 in Kansas. For persons who are minors or who are under guardianship, the 14 actions of the parent or guardian shall be deemed to be the actions of the 15 child or ward in determining whether or not the person is remaining 16 outside the state voluntarily.

17 (f) Medical assistance; assignment of rights to medical support and *limited power of attorney; recovery from estates of deceased recipients.* (1) 18 19 (A) Except as otherwise provided in K.S.A. 39-786 and 39-787, and 20 amendments thereto, or as otherwise authorized on and after September 21 30, 1989, under section 303 of the federal medicare catastrophic coverage 22 act of 1988, whichever is applicable, by applying for or receiving medical 23 assistance under a medical care plan in which federal funds are expended, 24 any accrued, present or future rights to support and any rights to payment 25 for medical care from a third party of an applicant or recipient and any 26 other family member for whom the applicant is applying shall be deemed 27 to have been assigned to the secretary on behalf of the state. The 28 assignment shall automatically become effective upon the date of approval 29 for such assistance without the requirement that any document be signed 30 by the applicant or recipient. By applying for or receiving medical 31 assistance the applicant or recipient is also deemed to have appointed the 32 secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the 33 specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders 34 or other negotiable instruments, representing payments received by the 35 secretary-in on behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having 36 received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective 37 from the date the secretary approves the application for assistance and 38 shall remain in effect until the assignment has been terminated in full. The 39 assignment of any rights to payment for medical care from a third party 40 under this subsection shall not prohibit a health care provider from directly 41 billing an insurance carrier for services rendered if the provider has not 42 submitted a claim covering such services to the secretary for payment. 43 Support amounts collected on behalf of persons whose rights to support

are assigned to the secretary only under this subsection and no other shall
 be distributed pursuant to K.S.A. 39-756(d), and amendments thereto,
 except that any amounts designated as medical support shall be retained by
 the secretary for repayment of the unreimbursed portion of assistance.
 Amounts collected pursuant to the assignment of rights to payment for
 medical care from a third party shall also be retained by the secretary for
 repayment of the unreimbursed portion of assistance.

8 (B) Notwithstanding the provisions of subparagraph (A), the 9 secretary of health and environment, or the secretary's designee, is hereby 10 authorized to and shall exercise any of the powers specified in 11 subparagraph (A) in relation to performance of such secretary's duties 12 pertaining to medical subrogation, estate recovery or any other duties 13 assigned to such secretary in article 74 of chapter 75 of the Kansas Statutes 14 Annotated, and amendments thereto.

15 (2) The amount of any medical assistance paid after June 30, 1992, 16 under the provisions of subsection (d) is: (A) A claim against the property 17 or any interest therein belonging to and a part of the estate of any deceased 18 recipient or, if there is no estate, the estate of the surviving spouse, if any, shall be charged for such medical assistance paid to either or both; and (B) 19 20 a claim against any funds of such recipient or spouse in any account under 21 K.S.A. 9-1215, 9-1216, 17-2263, 17-2264, 17-5828 or 17-5829, and 22 amendments thereto. There shall be no recovery of medical assistance 23 correctly paid to or on behalf of an individual under subsection (d) except 24 after the death of the surviving spouse of the individual, if any, and only at 25 a time when the individual has no surviving child who is under 21 years of 26 age or is blind or permanently and totally disabled. Transfers of real or 27 personal property by recipients of medical assistance without adequate 28 consideration are voidable and may be set aside. Except where there is a surviving spouse, or a surviving child who is under 21 years of age or is 29 30 blind or permanently and totally disabled, the amount of any medical 31 assistance paid under subsection (d) is a claim against the estate in any 32 guardianship or conservatorship proceeding. The monetary value of any 33 benefits received by the recipient of such medical assistance under long-34 term care insurance, as defined by K.S.A. 40-2227, and amendments 35 thereto, shall be a credit against the amount of the claim provided for such 36 medical assistance under this subsection. The secretary of health and 37 environment is authorized to enforce each claim provided for under this 38 subsection. The secretary of health and environment shall not be required 39 to pursue every claim, but is granted discretion to determine which claims 40 to pursue. All moneys received by the secretary of health and environment 41 from claims under this subsection shall be deposited in the social welfare 42 fund. The secretary of health and environment may adopt rules and 43 regulations for the implementation and administration of the medical

1 assistance recovery program under this subsection.

2 (3) By applying for or receiving medical assistance under the 3 provisions of article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and 4 amendments thereto, such individual or such individual's agent, fiduciary, 5 guardian, conservator, representative payee or other person acting on 6 behalf of the individual consents to the following definitions of estate and 7 the results therefrom:

8 (A) If an individual receives any medical assistance before July 1, 9 2004, pursuant to article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, 10 and amendments thereto, which forms the basis for a claim under 11 paragraph (2), such claim is limited to the individual's probatable estate as 12 defined by applicable law; and

13 (B) if an individual receives any medical assistance on or after July 1, 14 2004, pursuant to article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto, which forms the basis for a claim under 15 16 paragraph (2), such claim shall apply to the individual's medical assistance 17 estate. The medical assistance estate is defined as including all real and 18 personal property and other assets in which the deceased individual had 19 any legal title or interest immediately before or at the time of death to the 20 extent of that interest or title. The medical assistance estate includes, 21 without limitation assets conveyed to a survivor, heir or assign of the 22 deceased recipient through joint tenancy, tenancy in common, 23 survivorship, transfer-on-death deed, payable-on-death contract, life estate, 24 trust, annuities or similar arrangement.

25 (4) The secretary of health and environment or the secretary's designee is authorized to file and enforce a lien against the real property of 26 27 a recipient of medical assistance in certain situations, subject to all prior 28 liens of record and transfers for value to a bona fide purchaser of record. 29 The lien must be filed in the office of the register of deeds of the county 30 where the real property is located within one year from the date of death of 31 the recipient and must contain the legal description of all real property in 32 the county subject to the lien.

(A) After the death of a recipient of medical assistance, the secretary
of health and environment or the secretary's designee may place a lien on
any interest in real property owned by such recipient.

36 (B) The secretary of health and environment or the secretary's 37 designee may place a lien on any interest in real property owned by a 38 recipient of medical assistance during the lifetime of such recipient. Such 39 lien may be filed only after notice and an opportunity for a hearing has 40 been given. Such lien may be enforced only upon competent medical 41 testimony that the recipient cannot reasonably be expected to be 42 discharged and returned home. A six-month period of compensated 43 inpatient care at a nursing home or other medical institution shall

1 constitute a determination by the department of health and environment 2 that the recipient cannot reasonably be expected to be discharged and 3 returned home. To return home means the recipient leaves the nursing or 4 medical facility and resides in the home on which the lien has been placed 5 for a continuous period of at least 90 days without being readmitted as an 6 inpatient to a nursing or medical facility. The amount of the lien shall be 7 for the amount of assistance paid by the department of health and 8 environment until the time of the filing of the lien and for any amount paid 9 thereafter for such medical assistance to the recipient. After the lien is filed 10 against any real property owned by the recipient, such lien will be dissolved if the recipient is discharged, returns home and resides upon the 11 12 real property to which the lien is attached for a continuous period of at 13 least 90 days without being readmitted as an inpatient to a nursing or 14 medical facility. If the recipient is readmitted as an inpatient to a nursing or 15 medical facility for a continuous period of less than 90 days, another 16 continuous period of at least 90 days shall be completed prior to 17 dissolution of the lien

18 (5) The lien filed by the secretary of health and environment or the 19 secretary's designee for medical assistance correctly received may be 20 enforced before or after the death of the recipient by the filing of an action 21 to foreclose such lien in the Kansas district court or through an estate 22 probate court action in the county where the real property of the recipient 23 is located. However, it may be enforced only:

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(A) After the death of the surviving spouse of the recipient;

(B) when there is no child of the recipient, natural or adopted, who is20 years of age or less residing in the home;

(C) when there is no adult child of the recipient, natural or adopted,who is blind or disabled residing in the home; or

(D) when no brother or sister of the recipient is lawfully residing in
the home, who has resided there for at least one year immediately before
the date of the recipient's admission to the nursing or medical facility, and
has resided there on a continuous basis since that time.

(6) The lien remains on the property even after a transfer of the title
by conveyance, sale, succession, inheritance or will unless one of the
following events occur:

(A) The lien is satisfied. The recipient, the heirs, personal
representative or assigns of the recipient may discharge such lien at any
time by paying the amount of the lien to the secretary of health and
environment or the secretary's designee;

40 (B) the lien is terminated by foreclosure of prior lien of record or 41 settlement action taken in lieu of foreclosure; or

42 (C) the value of the real property is consumed by the lien, at which 43 time the secretary of health and environment or the secretary's designee

1 may force the sale for the real property to satisfy the lien.

2 (7) If the secretary for aging and disability services or the secretary of 3 health and environment, or both, or such secretary's designee has not filed 4 an action to foreclose the lien in the Kansas district court in the county 5 where the real property is located within 10 years from the date of the 6 filing of the lien, then the lien shall become dormant, and shall cease to 7 operate as a lien on the real estate of the recipient. Such dormant lien may 8 be revived in the same manner as a dormant judgment lien is revived under 9 K.S.A. 60-2403 et seq., and amendments thereto.

10 (8) Within seven days of receipt of notice by the secretary for 11 children and families or the secretary's designee of the death of a recipient 12 of medical assistance under this subsection, the secretary for children and 13 families or the secretary's designee shall give notice of such recipient's 14 death to the secretary of health and environment or the secretary's 15 designee.

16 (9) All rules and regulations adopted on and after July 1, 2013, and 17 prior to July 1, 2014, to implement this subsection shall continue to be 18 effective and shall be deemed to be duly adopted rules and regulations of 19 the secretary of health and environment until revised, amended, revoked or 20 nullified pursuant to law.

21 (g) Placement under the revised Kansas code for care of children or 22 revised Kansas juvenile justice code; assignment of support rights and 23 limited power of attorney. In any case in which the secretary for children 24 and families pays for the expenses of care and custody of a child pursuant 25 to K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 38-2201 et seq. or 38-2301 et seq., and amendments thereto, including the expenses of any foster care placement, an 26 27 assignment of all past, present and future support rights of the child in 28 custody possessed by either parent or other person entitled to receive 29 support payments for the child is, by operation of law, conveyed to the 30 secretary. Such assignment shall become effective upon placement of a 31 child in the custody of the secretary or upon payment of the expenses of 32 care and custody of a child by the secretary without the requirement that 33 any document be signed by the parent or other person entitled to receive 34 support payments for the child. When the secretary pays for the expenses 35 of care and custody of a child or a child is placed in the custody of the 36 secretary, the parent or other person entitled to receive support payments 37 for the child is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the 38 secretary's designee, as attorney in fact to perform the specific act of 39 negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other 40 negotiable instruments representing support payments received by the 41 secretary on behalf of the child. This limited power of attorney shall be 42 effective from the date the assignment to support rights becomes effective 43 and shall remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been

1 terminated in full.

2 (h) No person who voluntarily guits employment or who is fired from 3 employment due to gross misconduct as defined by rules and regulations 4 of the secretary or who is a fugitive from justice by reason of a felony 5 conviction or charge or violation of a condition of probation or parole 6 imposed under federal or state law shall be eligible to receive public 7 assistance benefits in this state. Any recipient of public assistance who 8 fails to timely comply with monthly reporting requirements under criteria 9 and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary shall be 10 subject to a penalty established by the secretary by rules and regulations.

11 (i) If the applicant or recipient of temporary assistance for needy 12 families is a mother of the dependent child, as a condition of the mother's 13 eligibility for temporary assistance for needy families the mother shall 14 identify by name and, if known, by current address the father of the dependent child except that the secretary may adopt by rules and 15 16 regulations exceptions to this requirement in cases of undue hardship. Any 17 recipient of temporary assistance for needy families who fails to cooperate 18 with requirements relating to child support services under criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary shall be 19 20 subject to a penalty established by the secretary.

21 (i) By applying for or receiving child care benefits or food assistance, 22 the applicant or recipient shall be deemed to have assigned, pursuant to 23 K.S.A. 39-756, and amendments thereto, to the secretary on behalf of the 24 state only accrued, present or future rights to support from any other 25 person such applicant may have in such person's own behalf or in behalf of 26 any other family member for whom the applicant is applying for or 27 receiving aid. The assignment of support rights shall automatically become 28 effective upon the date of approval for or receipt of such aid without the 29 requirement that any document be signed by the applicant or recipient. By 30 applying for or receiving child care benefits or food assistance, the 31 applicant or recipient is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the 32 secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the specific act of 33 negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other 34 negotiable instruments representing support payments received by the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having 35 36 received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective 37 from the date the secretary approves the application for aid and shall 38 remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been terminated 39 in full. An applicant or recipient who has assigned support rights to the 40 secretary pursuant to this subsection shall cooperate in establishing and 41 enforcing support obligations to the same extent required of applicants for 42 or recipients of temporary assistance for needy families.

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(k) (1) A program of drug screening for applicants for cash assistance

1 as a condition of eligibility for cash assistance and persons receiving cash 2 assistance as a condition of continued receipt of cash assistance shall be 3 established, subject to applicable federal law, by the secretary for children 4 and families on and before January 1, 2014. Under such program of drug 5 screening, the secretary for children and families shall order a drug 6 screening of an applicant for or a recipient of cash assistance at any time 7 when reasonable suspicion exists that such applicant for or recipient of 8 cash assistance is unlawfully using a controlled substance or controlled 9 substance analog. The secretary for children and families may use any 10 information obtained by the secretary for children and families to determine whether such reasonable suspicion exists, including, but not 11 12 limited to, an applicant's or recipient's demeanor, missed appointments and 13 arrest or other police records, previous employment or application for 14 employment in an occupation or industry that regularly conducts drug 15 screening, termination from previous employment due to unlawful use of a 16 controlled substance or controlled substance analog or prior drug screening 17 records of the applicant or recipient indicating unlawful use of a controlled 18 substance or controlled substance analog.

19 (2) Any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance whose drug 20 screening results in a positive test may request that the drug screening 21 specimen be sent to a different drug testing facility for an additional drug 22 screening. Any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance who requests 23 an additional drug screening at a different drug testing facility shall be 24 required to pay the cost of drug screening. Such applicant or recipient who 25 took the additional drug screening and who tested negative for unlawful 26 use of a controlled substance and controlled substance analog shall be 27 reimbursed for the cost of such additional drug screening.

28 (3) Any applicant for or recipient of cash assistance who tests 29 positive for unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled substance 30 analog shall be required to complete a substance abuse treatment program 31 approved by the secretary for children and families, secretary of labor or 32 secretary of commerce, and a job skills program approved by the secretary 33 for children and families, secretary of labor or secretary of commerce. 34 Subject to applicable federal laws, any applicant for or recipient of cash 35 assistance who fails to complete or refuses to participate in the substance 36 abuse treatment program or job skills program as required under this 37 subsection shall be ineligible to receive cash assistance until completion of 38 such substance abuse treatment and job skills programs. Upon completion 39 of both substance abuse treatment and job skills programs, such applicant 40 for or recipient of cash assistance may be subject to periodic drug 41 screening, as determined by the secretary for children and families. Upon a 42 second positive test for unlawful use of a controlled substance or 43 controlled substance analog, a recipient of cash assistance shall be ordered

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to complete again a substance abuse treatment program and job skills program, and shall be terminated from cash assistance for a period of 12 3 months, or until such recipient of cash assistance completes both substance 4 abuse treatment and job skills programs, whichever is later. Upon a third positive test for unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled 6 substance analog, a recipient of cash assistance shall be terminated from 7 cash assistance, subject to applicable federal law.

8 (4) If an applicant for or recipient of cash assistance is ineligible for 9 or terminated from cash assistance as a result of a positive test for 10 unlawful use of a controlled substance or controlled substance analog, and such applicant for or recipient of cash assistance is the parent or legal 11 12 guardian of a minor child, an appropriate protective payee shall be 13 designated to receive cash assistance on behalf of such child. Such parent 14 or legal guardian of the minor child may choose to designate an individual 15 to receive cash assistance for such parent's or legal guardian's minor child, 16 as approved by the secretary for children and families. Prior to the 17 designated individual receiving any cash assistance, the secretary for 18 children and families shall review whether reasonable suspicion exists that 19 such designated individual is unlawfully using a controlled substance or 20 controlled substance analog.

21 (A) In addition, any individual designated to receive cash assistance 22 on behalf of an eligible minor child shall be subject to drug screening at 23 any time when reasonable suspicion exists that such designated individual 24 is unlawfully using a controlled substance or controlled substance analog. 25 The secretary for children and families may use any information obtained 26 by the secretary for children and families to determine whether such 27 reasonable suspicion exists, including, but not limited to, the designated 28 individual's demeanor, missed appointments and arrest or other police 29 records, previous employment or application for employment in an 30 occupation or industry that regularly conducts drug screening, termination 31 from previous employment due to unlawful use of a controlled substance 32 or controlled substance analog or prior drug screening records of the 33 designated individual indicating unlawful use of a controlled substance or 34 controlled substance analog.

35 (B) Any designated individual whose drug screening results in a 36 positive test may request that the drug screening specimen be sent to a 37 different drug testing facility for an additional drug screening. Any 38 designated individual who requests an additional drug screening at a 39 different drug testing facility shall be required to pay the cost of drug 40 screening. Such designated individual who took the additional drug 41 screening and who tested negative for unlawful use of a controlled 42 substance and controlled substance analog shall be reimbursed for the cost 43 of such additional drug screening.

1 (C) Upon any positive test for unlawful use of a controlled substance 2 or controlled substance analog, the designated individual shall not receive 3 cash assistance on behalf of the parent's or legal guardian's minor child, 4 and another designated individual shall be selected by the secretary for 5 children and families to receive cash assistance on behalf of such parent's 6 or legal guardian's minor child.

7 (5) If a person has been convicted under federal or state law of any 8 offense which is classified as a felony by the law of the jurisdiction and which has as an element of such offense the manufacture, cultivation, 9 10 distribution, possession or use of a controlled substance or controlled substance analog, and the date of conviction is on or after July 1, 2013, 11 such person shall thereby become forever ineligible to receive any cash 12 assistance under this subsection unless such conviction is the person's first 13 conviction. First-time offenders convicted under federal or state law of any 14 offense which is classified as a felony by the law of the jurisdiction and 15 16 which has as an element of such offense the manufacture, cultivation, distribution, possession or use of a controlled substance or controlled 17 18 substance analog, and the date of conviction is on or after July 1, 2013, 19 such person shall become ineligible to receive cash assistance for five 20 vears from the date of conviction.

(6) Except for hearings before the Kansas department for children
and families or, the results of any drug screening administered as part of
the drug screening program authorized by this subsection shall be
confidential and shall not be disclosed publicly.

(7) The secretary for children and families may adopt such rules andregulations as are necessary to carry out the provisions of this subsection.

(8) Any authority granted to the secretary for children and families
under this subsection shall be in addition to any other penalties prescribed
by law.

(A) "Cash assistance" means cash assistance provided to individuals
under the provisions of article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes
Annotated, and amendments thereto, and any rules and regulations adopted

37 (d) An institutional license shall expire on the date established by 38 rules and regulations of the board which may provide for renewal 39 throughout the year on a continuing basis.
