Oral Testimony in support of SB 251 Senate Commerce Committee

Chair Tarwater, Vice-Chair Corbet and Ranking Minority Member Frownfelter, thank you for the opportunity to speak in support of SB 251, a measure that I have been thinking about for the past several years. The business community in my district is very supportive and I have not talked to a business yet that would appreciate any reporting or regulatory relief we can manage to provide.

Currently businesses are required to file corporate reports every year. The passage of SB 251 would allow any business to file biennially. Currently the annual filing fee is \$40 for an annual report. The bill would allow the business to pay \$80 at the beginning of the two-year or period advance.

In cooperation with the Secretary of State's office, the bill becomes effective on July 1, 2022.

Passage of SB 251 will:

- Allow businesses to file up to two years at a time.
- Require prepayment for two years, saving both the business and the Secretary of State time and effort.
- Be revenue neutral to the SGF.
- Be more efficient for the Secretary of State who will need to expend less energy to collect fees that will be collected sooner.
- Encourage more businesses to domicile in Kansas.

- Applies to all business entities including the following: Corporations (both for-profit and not-for-profit); Limited liability companies; Partnerships; Limited partnerships; Limited liability partnerships; Business trusts and Cooperatives (*not* included are charitable organizations that solicit donations and labor organizations).
- Make Kansas the 14th state to enact business friendly reporting:
