### **Presentation on:**

Connie Owen, Director of the Kansas Water Office, thanked the committee for the opportunity to return to testify and introduced the presenters that would follow her ([Attachment 1](#)), then directed committee to the directory of Kansas Water Authority's Regional Advisory Committee members that had been distributed ([Attachment 2](#)).

Dawn Buehler, Chair of the Kansas Water Authority, began a presentation which provided an overview of the roles, reporting structures and budget information of the KWA ([Attachment 3](#)). The KWA's primary responsibilities include advising the Governor, Legislature and Director of the Kansas Water Office on water policy issues, approving the Kansas Water Plan, approving federal contracts, administration regulations and legislation proposed by the KWA, and preparing and issuing an Annual Report to Governor and Legislature. It consists of 13 voting members who are appointed by the Governor or legislative leadership. State agency directors or appointees serve as exofficio members.

Jeremiah Hobbs, KWA Regional Advisory Committee Operations Committee Chair, then continued the presentation. He described the boundaries and roles of the RACs, and described the roles and qualifications of their members, who serve on a volunteer basis. He then described the state water planning cycle, which takes input from RACs, the public, and legislators, and repeats in 5-year increments after each new state water plan is released.

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Unless specifically noted, the individual remarks recorded herein have not been transcribed verbatim. Individual remarks as reported herein have not been submitted to the individuals appearing before the committee for editing or corrections.

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The conferees then stood for questions from the committee, which covered topics including the timeframe of the 50-year water plan, whether injection drilling impact groundwater management districts, what's being done to fill the vacant RAC positions, how many seats are on each RAC, what the membership criteria are for RAC members, and demographic inequities in water issues. Some answers, which required further research, were later provided to the committee ([Attachment 4](#)).
