Chairman Bergquist and Members of the Committee:

Kansas Justice Institute¹ strongly supports paring back unreasonable and unconstitutional restrictions on home-based businesses by Kansas municipalities.

In 2023, KJI filed a lawsuit in state court defending our client's constitutional right to garden and produce local honey, as a home-based business. The municipality had prohibited any home-based business not conducted entirely within a dwelling and all home-based businesses involving animals. Since gardens grow outside, and honeybees are animals, our client was prohibited from using her own backyard to garden and safely raise honey, as a home-based business. The very same activities—gardening and beekeeping—were permitted as hobbies.²

In our view, far too many municipalities restrict home-based businesses based on outdated reasoning. The restrictions are an unconstitutional infringement on the constitutional right to earn an honest living. We have a good faith basis to believe that municipalities are even prohibiting—unconstitutionally so, in our view—mundane home-based businesses like baking cookies.

HB 2704 is a good start in paring back this municipal overreach. To that end, KJI supports this bill.
