When horse racing left Kansas it took citizens, jobs, tourists and income out of the state. This bill will allow for those key ingredients and a successful economy to come back to Kansas.

Currently, an average visitor to Kansas spends \$261 per day with an average length of stay of 1.63 days. The majority of visitors travel by car an average of 222 miles, 1-way. Kansas travelers who stay two nights or more are most profitable (travelks.com).

The track is part of a 69-acre property that has the community's attention. The concourse building is slated to become a multiuse community facility, housing a community room upstairs. Eureka's ProRodeo brought in 2,500 people to it Saturday night performance in August 2022. But at the heart of this historic acreage is a horseracing track. By committing to this bill you connect the dots and bring one more reason for people to visit and linger in the tallgrass prairie.
