Chairman Peck and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill 389. This testimony is submitted jointly by the Kansas Grain and Feed Association (KGFA), Kansas Agribusiness Retailers Association (KARA), and Renew Kansas Biofuels Association.

KGFA is the state association of the grain receiving, storage, processing, and shipping industry in Kansas. Representing 99% of the commercially licensed grain storage in the state, KGFA membership exceeds 950 Kansas business locations. KARA is a state agribusiness trade association comprising more than 700 member companies that supply inputs to Kansas farmers. Renew Kansas is the trade association of the Kansas biofuels processing industry. Renew Kansas mission is to demonstrate the positive impacts of biofuels on the Kansas and national economy.

Our member grain elevators, biofuel processing plants, and agribusiness facilities play an important role in Kansas agriculture and contribute greatly to the Kansas economy. They provide gainful employment for thousands of Kansans across the state, and they pay millions of dollars in property taxes which help fund schools and local government services.

Senate Bill 389 would amend portions of Kansas law to enhance protections for our important agricultural facilities - both animal agriculture facilities and field crop research and production facilities.

Kansas agriculture continues to feed, fuel, and clothe a growing world population. To protect our food and energy resources, it is imperative that our critical agricultural infrastructure facilities be protected from those that would seek to harm or hinder animal and field crop production. Passage of this bill will increase protections for those important facilities.

Thank you for allowing us the opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill 389. This bill represents sound public policy for the state of Kansas and Kansas agriculture.

For the reasons stated, we would request that the committee pass the bill out favorably.
