Re: Senate Bill 47

Dear Senator Erickson and Committee Members,

I am writing on behalf of the City of Lawrence to oppose Senate Bill 47 and urge the committee to reject this pre-emptive legislation. While we appreciate your efforts to balance issues critical to our state, our locally elected officials are accountable to the voters for the decisions they make on behalf of our community. Senate Bill 47 would erode the Home Rule Authority of Kansas cities, granted by the people in this State in 1960 through amendment to the Kansas Constitution, and remove our ability to be responsive to an issue our community has prioritized.

The City of Lawrence embraces our community commitment to environmental sustainability, *a deep respect for our place in relationship with the planet and environment*, as highlighted in our Strategic Plan, and our community would like to pursue a high quality of life for our residents and environment without undue oversight and restrictions of the State. A group of fourth grade students from our community elevated the issue of harmful plastics a few years ago to the City Commission. Since then, we have researched the local impacts of single-use plastics, including infiltration of local waterways (Clinton Lake and the Kansas River); challenges in the City's recycling facility, increasing operational costs; getting into sewers and drainage ditches, making storm water run-off less efficient; and being a particularly unattractive source of litter that gets stuck in trees and vegetation. There are also impacts to livestock and wildlife. Plastics have human health implications, with increasing numbers of research indicating a possibility of endocrine system disruption associated with the decomposition of plastic products. We have heard from over 700 people in Lawrence who feel strongly about this issue and have worked to strike a balance with local retailers. We are using their feedback, along with research findings, to develop a strategy to reduce single-use plastic bags and improve the quality of life in our community.

The City of Lawrence respectfully requests that the Committee acknowledge the importance of local government retaining control over issues such as those covered by Senate Bill 47 and refrain from passing Senate Bill 47 out of committee.
