On behalf of Americans for Tax Reform and our supporters across Kansas, I urge you to support SB 373, which will prevent local government entities from spending public funds to influence state legislative outcomes. This much needed reform will serve as a shield for taxpayers who would rather not be forced to pay for the big-government priorities of government agencies and municipalities.

Far too often, the biggest proponents of higher taxes are those whose salaries are funded by those very same taxes. Indeed, the practice of taxpayer-funded lobbying only exacerbates government waste, as higher government spending is nearly always in the interest of a public entity and its paid representatives. Taxpayer-funded lobbyists also tend to support more governmental regulation that accrues more power to their own municipality, school district or agency. Too often, taxpaying families and businesses are left footing the bill for not only the increased spending and regulations, but the lobbying responsible for its success.

Taxpayer-funded lobbying by cities, counties, and school districts is rampant. Local government entities have become the largest spender of lobbying dollars in several states, spending more money on contract lobbyists than many unions, corporations, and industry associations. A 2020 audit revealed that 63 Kansas lobbyists received well over \$1 million in tax dollars to lobby on behalf of state agencies, local governments or associations tied to government activities. On top of that, \$5 million in state and local funds went to Kansan associations that lobby the state or federal government. Meanwhile, California local governments spent \$24.3 million on contract lobbyists through the first six months of 2017, an average of \$135,000 of taxpayer money per calendar day. These figures constitute an unacceptable misappropriation of tax dollars.

Although taxpayer-funded lobbying is wildly unpopular among the general population, most taxpayers are unaware that their city or county government is spending thousands of dollars every year on contract lobbyists. Details of lobbying contracts are not well-publicized and are not transparent. Many cities do not disclose the dollar amounts of lobbying contracts, and many states do not require detailed public disclosure. Data on taxpayer-funded lobbying is not widely available for most states, making the actual scope of the issue difficult to communicate to the public.

There is no reason why the government should spend taxpayer money to lobby itself when local governments and other entities already have advocates in the form of elected officials. As Thomas Jefferson put it, "To compel a man to furnish funds for the propagation of ideas he disbelieves and abhors is sinful and tyrannical." For these reasons, ATR strongly urges you to support SB 373 and put an end to lobbying at the taxpayers' expense.
