AN ACT concerning the department of health and environment; establishing the prevention of maternal mortality grant program within the department of health and environment; establishing the prevention of maternal mortality grant program fund and making transfers thereto; providing competitive grants to programs for the prevention of maternal mortality and severe maternal morbidity.

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Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) As used in this section:

- (1) "Culturally respectful congruent" means sensitive to and respectful of the preferred cultural values, beliefs, world view and practices of the patient and aware that cultural differences between patients and healthcare providers or other service providers must be proactively addressed to ensure that patients receive equitable, high-quality services that meet such patients' needs;
- (2) "department" means the Kansas department of health and environment;
- (3) "postpartum" means the one-year period beginning on the last day of a woman's pregnancy; and
 - (4) "secretary" means the secretary of health and environment.
- (b) (1) Subject to the availability of appropriations, the department shall establish and operate a prevention of maternal mortality grant program to award competitive grants to eligible entities in order to establish or expand programs for the prevention of maternal mortality and severe maternal morbidity among rural women and women of color. The department shall establish eligibility requirements for program participation that require applicants to be community-based organizations that offer programs and resources that are aligned with evidence-based practices for improving maternal health outcomes for rural women and women of color.
 - (2) On and after July 1, 2024, the department shall:
- (A) Conduct outreach to encourage eligible applicants to apply for grants under this program; and
 - (B) provide application assistance to eligible applicants on best practices for applying for grants under this program. In conducting the outreach required by this section, the department shall give special

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consideration to eligible applicants that:

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- (i) Are based in and provide support for communities with high rates of adverse maternal health outcomes and significant racial and ethnic disparities in maternal health outcomes;
 - (ii) are led by rural women and women of color; and
- (iii) offer programs and resources that are aligned with evidencebased practices for improving maternal health outcomes for rural women and women of color.
- (3) In awarding grants under this section, the department shall award a maximum of 20 grants and to the greatest extent possible, the grant recipients shall represent different areas of the state. The department award each grant in an amount not less than \$50,000 and not greater than \$250,000 per grant recipient. In selecting grant recipients, the department shall give special consideration to eligible applicants that:
 - (A) Meet all the criteria specified in paragraph (2);
- (2) offer programs and resources designed in consultation with and intended for rural women and women of color; and
- (3) offer programs and resources in the communities where they are located that include any of the following activities:
- (i) Addressing social determinants of health for women in the prenatal and postpartum periods, including, but not limited to:
 - (a) Inadequate housing;
 - (b) barriers to transportation;
 - (c) poor nutrition and a lack of access to healthy foods;
 - (d) need for lactation support;
- 26 (e) need for lead abatement and other efforts to improve air and water quality;
 - (f) lack of access to child care:
 - (g) need for baby supplies such as diapers, formula, clothing, baby and child equipment and safe car seat installation;
 - (h) need for wellness and stress-management programs;
 - (i) education about maternal health and well-being; and
 - (j) need for coordination across safety net and social support services and programs;
 - (ii) promoting evidence-based health literacy and pregnancy, childbirth, and parenting education for women in the prenatal and postpartum periods, including group-based programs and peer support groups;
 - (iii) providing individually tailored support from doulas and other perinatal health workers to women from pregnancy through the postpartum period;
- 42 (iv) providing culturally respectful congruent training to perinatal 43 healthcare workers such as doulas, certified nurse-midwives, community

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health workers, peer supporters, certified lactation consultants, nutritionists and dietitians, social workers, home visitors and navigators;

- (v) conducting or supporting research on issues affecting black maternal health.
- (vi) developing other programs and resources that address community-specific needs for women in the prenatal and postpartum periods and are aligned with evidence-based practices for improving maternal health outcomes for rural women and women of color.
- (4) The department shall provide technical assistance to grant recipients regarding all of the following:
- (A) Capacity building to establish or expand programs preventing adverse maternal health outcomes among rural women and women of color;
- (B) best practices in data collection, measurement, evaluation and reporting; and
- (C) planning centered around sustaining programs implemented with grant funds to prevent maternal mortality and severe maternal morbidity among rural women and women of color when the grant funds have been expended.
- (c) On or before October 1, 2025, the department shall submit a report on the grant program authorized by this section to the senate standing committee on public health and welfare and the house standing committee on health and human services or their successor committees. Such report shall include:
- (1) A detailed report on funds expended for the program for the most recent fiscal year;
- (2) an assessment of the effectiveness of outreach efforts by the department during the application process in diversifying the pool of grant recipients; and
- (3) recommendations for future outreach efforts to diversify the pool of grant recipients for this program and other related grant programs, as well as for funding opportunities related to the social determinants of maternal health.
- (d) The department may employ one full time coordinator position to perform the responsibilities described in this section. Such coordinator shall be in the unclassified service and receive a salary as fixed by secretary.
- (e) There is hereby established in the state treasury the prevention of maternal mortality grant program, which shall be administered by the secretary. All expenditures from the prevention of maternal mortality grant program fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by state treasurer or the treasurer's designee. The

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secretary shall remit such supplemental and matching moneys to the state treasurer in accordance with K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury to the credit of the prevention of maternal mortality grant program fund. Moneys in the prevention of maternal mortality grant program fund shall be used for the purposes as set forth in this section.

- (f) The provisions of this section shall expire on Jun 30, 2029.
- New Sec. 2. (a) On July 1, 2024, and on each July 1 thereafter, or as soon thereafter each such date as moneys are available, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer \$3,300,000 from the state general fund to the prevention of maternal mortality grant program fund.
 - (b) The provisions of this section shall expire on Jun 30, 2029.
- Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.
