STATE OF KANSAS House Committee on Elections Testimony on House Bill 2437

Secretary of State Kris W. Kobach

February 1, 2012

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of House Bill 2437. I proposed this bill to move the effective date of the requirement to provide evidence of United States citizenship from January 1, 2013 to June 15, 2012. Passage of this bill will put all of the protections of the 2011 Secure and Fair Elections Act (S.A.F.E.) into place before this year's elections.

Under S.A.F.E., voters will be required to provide photo identification when voting in the 2012 elections, but they will continue to register to vote without proof of U.S. citizenship until after the 2012 presidential election.

H.B. 2437 merely moves the implementation date forward by approximately six months. Currently, the law is set to go into effect roughly two months after the Presidential election this November. As I have already presented to this committee, there have been reports of voter fraud in Kansas in the past. The 2010 Election was no different. There were 41 additional reports of voter fraud. We are working with state and local law enforcement officials to fully investigate these allegations.

Even more importantly, for the purpose of the proof of citizenship requirement, my office discovered 32 aliens who were registered to vote in Kansas last year. This number only includes documented aliens. When the total number of illegal undocumented aliens is calculated, this number could be much higher. Unlike legally present non-US Citizens who obtain temporary driver's licenses, there is no list of undocumented illegal aliens to compare with our voter records. Therefore, any illegal alien that registers to vote before the implementation date will likely go undetected for several years.

In 1997, a ballot issue was before voters concerning whether to allow a particular type of hog farming operation in Seward County. A few weeks before the election, a bus full of individuals believed to be aliens rolled up to the county clerk's office, where they were unloaded and told to register to vote. The clerk realized what was happening, but she was powerless to stop it. Under Kansas law at the time, the clerk had to allow them to register as long as they filled out and signed a voter registration card.

Another incident happened in 2010, just across the state line. In the 2010 state representative race in Kansas City, Mo., between J.J. Rizzo and Will Royster, the election was allegedly stolen

when Rizzo received approximately 50 votes illegally cast by citizens of Somalia. According to eyewitnesses, the Somalis, who didn't speak English, were coached to vote in his favor by an "interpreter" at the polling place. The margin of victory? One vote.

To vote in Kansas, a person must be a U.S. Citizen. The S.A.F.E. Act passed with broad bipartisan support in Kansas. There is no reason to delay requirements which were supported by such a broad majority. The state must have anti-fraud measures in place as quickly as possible. In fact, delay causes more problems. Of the 32 matches we discovered last year, there are still 27 currently on our voter rolls. For legal reasons, it is incredibly difficult to remove individuals from the voter rolls, even if they are not legally qualified to vote. Moving the implementation date forward will protect our voter rolls and avoid the difficult and time intensive process of trying to remove these individuals in the future.

Every four years, there is a surge of new voter registrations in the months before a presidential election. For example, 148,957 people registered to vote in Kansas in the four months before the November 2008 presidential election. In contrast, an average of only approximately 6,200 voters registered each month in 2011.

A similar wave of new registrations is about to begin this summer in the run-up to the presidential election of 2012. The reason we need the proof of citizenship protection in place beforehand is that it is extremely difficult to find and remove the aliens on our voter rolls once they get on. Yet it is very easy to stop them from registering in the first place if the SAFE Act protections are in place. If we are serious about protecting the integrity of our voter rolls, we need to act now, before the wave of new voter registrations hits.

Additionally, a statewide voter education media campaign is already educating voters about the photo ID requirement that became effective January 1, 2012. My office is currently developing proof of citizenship educational materials. These materials will be distributed publically just before the effective date so citizens who register thereafter will know what documents to present at voter registration. Educating voters about the voter ID requirement and proof of citizenship requirement at the same time will minimize any confusion.

During 2012, there will be more than 165 elected positions on the ballot. Each candidate running for one of these positions is a stake holder in educating the public about this law. The incentive for these candidates to partner with my office to educate the public decreases dramatically after the November elections. Moving the date forward will ensure that candidates help educate Kansans about the proof of citizenship requirement as well as the photographic identification requirement.

Finally, the Division of Motor Vehicles believes that by June 15th it can confidentially and securely share driver's license proof of identity documentation with election officials who verify proof of citizenship for voting. The regulations that govern the proof of citizenship requirement are on target for adoption this month, well before June 15, and county election officials will be trained how to process such proof. Attached to this testimony is a letter from Secretary Jordan regarding the DMV's ability to implement the proof of citizenship requirement.

I urge the committee to recommend House Bill 2437 favorably for passage, to continue the work begun in 2011 with passage of the S.A.F.E. Act, and to avoid unnecessary delays in implementation of the important safeguards contained in the Act.

In response to your inquiry, I write to confirm that the Department of Revenue's Division of Vehicles completed the statewide rollout of its photo-first technology in 2011, which allows us to electronically capture proof of identity documents and more effectively verify lawful presence for driver's licenses as required by law.

We are now in the process of integrating the photo-first technology into our state's larger DMV modernization project, which we anticipate implementing this spring. While delays are always possible, we believe June 15, 2012, is a reasonable date by which we should be able to confidentially and securely share driver's license proof of identity documentation as allowed by law with election officials in your office who verify proof of citizenship for voting.

The following documents may be used as proof of United States citizenship for purposes of registering to vote in Kansas:

- Driver's license or nondriver identification card issued by the division
 of vehicles or the equivalent governmental agency of another state
 within the United States if the agency indicates on the applicant's
 driver's license or nondriver identification card that the person has
 provided satisfactory proof of United States citizenship
- · Birth certificate that verifies United States citizenship
- United States passport or pertinent pages of the applicant's United States valid or expired passport identifying the applicant and the applicant's passport number
- United States naturalization documents or the number of the certificate of naturalization. (If only the number of the certificate of naturalization is provided, the applicant shall not be included in the registration rolls until the number of the certificate of naturalization is verified with the United States Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services by the county election officer or the secretary of state, pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1373(c))
- Other documents or methods of proof of United States citizenship issued by the federal government pursuant to the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952

- Bureau of Indian Affairs card number, tribal treaty card number or tribal enrollment number
- Consular report of birth abroad of a citizen of the United States
- Certificate of citizenship issued by the United States Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services
- Certification of report of birth issued by the United States Department of State
- American Indian card, with KIC classification, issued by the United States Department of Homeland Security
- Final adoption decree showing the applicant's name and United States birthplace
- United States military record of service showing applicant's place of birth in the United States
- Extract from a United States hospital record of birth created at the time of the applicant's birth indicating the applicant's place of birth in the United States
