

Current Law (KSA 75-6524)

- Implemented January 2011
- Covers the diagnosis and medically necessary treatment of Autism Spectrum Disorders including behavioral health treatments such as Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA)
- Terms
 - \$36,000/yr cap 0-7 yr
 - \$27,000/yr cap 7-19 yr
- Applies only to the Kansas State Employees Health Plan



The “Pilot Project” Statute

40-2249a: Same; state employee group pilot project for new mandated health benefits. (a) After July 1, 1999, in addition to the requirements of K.S.A. 40-2248 and 40-2249, and amendments thereto, any new mandated health insurance coverage for specific health services, specific diseases or for certain providers of health care services approved by the legislature shall apply only to the state health care benefits program, K.S.A. 75-6501, *et seq.*, and amendments thereto, for a period of at least one year beginning with the first anniversary date of the state health care benefits program subsequent to approval of the mandate by the legislature. On or before March 1, after the one year period for which the mandate has been applied, the Kansas state employees health care commission shall submit to the president of the senate and to the speaker of the house of representatives, a report indicating the impact such mandated coverage has had on the state health care benefits program, including data on the utilization and costs of such mandated coverage. Such report shall also include a recommendation whether such mandated coverage should continue for the state health care benefits program or whether additional utilization and cost data is required. (b) The legislature shall periodically review all health insurance coverages mandated by state law.





Actual Claims Data CY 2011



- Implemented Jan 2011
- Terms
 - \$36,000/yr cap 0-7 yr
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
- Cost to Kansas* = \$163,430
- Total covered lives = 99,396 (46,276 contracts)
- Unique claimants = 126
- PMPM cost = **14 ¢**



Kansas State Employees Health Care Commission Report



- “The ASD coverage pilot had minimal impact on the SEHP” 
- Total ASD claims = **0.05%** of total claims
- ABA claims = **0.02%** of total claims

Affect on Premiums



- Claims incurred for treatment of ASD represent **0.1% of total claims** 
- “While claims costs are expected to grow somewhat in the future, it seems very unlikely that costs for autism treatment will have an appreciable impact on insurance premiums.”

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- Completed 
- Cost of coverage **14 ¢** PMPM
- Utilization of coverage 126/241 = **52%**
- Consistent with claims data from other states






- **2,322** out of an estimated 6,935 affected children would be eligible for coverage
- **2,081** more children than are covered by KSA 75-6524
- **No additional fiscal impact to the State**

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“What’s one more year?”



“The paucity of insurance benefits for effective treatments of ASDs very likely contributed to lasting functional impairment of individuals with autistic and related disorders. To the extent that such care cannot be funded by parents, nor provided publicly, individuals are likely to endure life-long cognitive and social deficits with enormous direct and indirect social costs (see Ganz, 2007).”

Further delays will cost over 2000 Kansas children...

- A chance for mainstream regular education versus special education
- A chance to be a productive tax-paying Kansan versus being dependent upon a lifetime of adult disability services
