MINUTES OF THE HOUSE REDISTRICTING COMMITTEE.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Michael R. O'Neal at 7:00 a.m. on February 12, 2002 in Room 313-S of the Capitol.

The Chairman noted that this summer the Joint Committee on Redistricting recommended the Caucus J map as the Congressional plan. No one assumed that it would be the final map, but just a jumping off point. However, it looks like that proposed map may not be far off from where the final map will end up.

Chairman O'Neal drew the committee's attention to five maps that were distributed to members:

HR Congress 1 (<u>Attachment 1</u>)

- Makes Kingman County whole
- \circ $\,$ Makes Riley & Geary counties whole
- Douglas & Harvey counties are split
- \circ Wabaunsee & Clay counties are added to the 2^{nd} district

HR Congress 2 (<u>Attachment 2</u>)

- Is similar to Caucus J
- Splits Lawrence down Massachusetts street
- o No townships are split around Lawrence
- Adds Linn County to the 3rd district

HR Congress 3 (<u>Attachment 3</u>)

- Places rural Geary County & the City of Manhattan in the 1st district
- Washington & Clay counties in the 2nd district

Representative Wilson asked if it was possible to keep Douglas County whole. Duane Simpson responded that to keep Douglas County whole one would have to move 100,000 people into the 2^{nd} district. That makes it much more difficult to draw the 1^{st} district and makes it necessary to add several other counties to the 3^{rd} district.

Representative Findley pointed out that the split of Lawrence down Massachusetts street would place Congressman Moore's district office in the 2^{nd} district.

Chairman O'Neal commented that if the committee decides to split VTDs, the population deviations could be brought to virtually zero.

Gorilla 1 (<u>Attachment 4</u>)

- \circ 4th district is substantially changed:
- Added Labette & Chase counties
- Added parts of Barber County
- Took out all of Harvey County
- o Took out part of Greenwood County
- Added the north part of Wanbunsee County to district 2

- Tries to retain communities of interest
- Tried to keep counties whole and not split VTDs
- Six counties are split to allow for one person, one vote

Chairman O'Neal recognized Representative Garry Boston who provided the committee with Caucus J-Kingman TR map (<u>Attachment 6</u>). It addresses the split of the City of Newton and Highland Township by returning both to the 4th district so Harvey County would be intact. Representative Krehbiel expressed his support for the proposed map. In response to a question, Representative Boston commented that splitting Harvey County would be better than placing it totally in the 1st district.

The committee meeting adjourned at 8:00 a.m. The next meeting was scheduled for February 13, 2002.
