# Staff Attending

Mary Galligan, Kansas Legislative Research Department Kathie Sparks, Kansas Legislative Research Department Cindy O'Neal, Committee Secretary

Chairman Michael R. O'Neal called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. He explained the redistricting process and introduced Mary Galligan who gave a Power Point Presentation (Attachment 1).

Janet Harrah, gave a slide presentation which focused on Kansas school district demographics (<u>Attachment 2</u>), 4<sup>th</sup> District Demographics which related to population growth (<u>Attachment 3</u>), and Wichita Demographics as it relates to the minority population (<u>Attachment 4</u>).

Senator Anthony Hensley and Representative Troy Findley provided the attendees with a proposed Congressional map for the 4th District (<u>Attachment 5</u>), along with a proposed Congressional map for the state (Attachment 5). Senator Hensley proceeded to give a Power Point Presentation explaining his proposed maps (<u>Attachment 6</u>).

Dan Woydziak is interested in Butler County being represented by one Senator and would like it to remain that way. He does not want part of Butler County to be swallowed up by Sedgwick County because he maintains that Butler County's needs are more rural than Sedgwick County's urban issues.

Lonnie Myklebust stated that he is impressed by the representation his neighborhood has received from both House and Senate representatives, but would like the Redistricting

Committees to consider having the district represented by one Senator instead of dividing his neighborhood in two (Attachment 7).

Lee Knich, Chair of the Sedgwick County Democratic Party, commented that the redistricting process should be respectful of cultural, ethnic and racial heritage, while not relying upon partisan politics (Attachment 8).

Susan Ledbetter addressed the House and Senate districts, maintaining that they should continue to reflect diversity. She was specifically concerned with change in representation in Senate Districts 25, 28, and 29 and House Districts 84, 88, 89, 92, 95, 96, and 98. She feels that the elected representatives have served these districts well and would hope that the boundaries would not be changed (Attachment 9).

Jason Dilts does not believe that it is right that when student numbers are readjusted that those from out of state are not counted in their home state. He believes that by not counting all students, the state is violating the doctrine of one person, one vote (<u>Attachment 10</u>).

Judge Charles Hart, a member of an *ad hoc* committee to address their concerns about highways, water resources, education, anticipated population growth, economic development, and to propose that whole communities be represented by legislative districts instead of the current practice of several representatives having a piece of a community. The map that was presented showed the different communities that are split and represented by different representatives (<u>Attachment 11</u>).

Reverend Wanda McDaniels has concerns as to whether minorities will be equally represented after the redistricting process (<u>Attachment 12</u>).

Dennis L. Bush commented that they have two representatives and are concerned as to whether their voice is being heard in Topeka. He hoped that the redistricting process would allow for only one representative.

The meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.
