Chairperson Gordon shared with the Committee information concerning the film bills. <u>**HB 2443**</u> and <u>**HB 2444**</u>. She and Representatives Huntington and Winn had worked with the members of the Film Commission trying to get film legislation to pass through the Senate. A substitute bill for <u>**HB 2443**</u> had been prepared with the assistance of the Secretary of Revenue. Department of Commerce was also in agreement with the substitute bill. However, no action was taken. Film legislation is something that will probably be looked at during interim and brought back before the Committee next session. It was learned that on the national level, there are some form of incentives or grants that are being offered to the large film makers. There may be guidelines in place, and if so, these guidelines could be included in Kansas legislation.
