Introduction of Legislation

Senator Schmidt moved to introduce legislation concerning rules and regulations pertaining to the residential childhood lead poisoning prevention act (9rs1190). The motion was seconded by Senator Teichman. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Senator Vratil moved to introduce legislation to amend the teacher continuing contract law (9rs1188). The motion was seconded by Senator Taddiken. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Senator Vratil moved to introduce legislation relating to school finance (9rs1289). The motion was seconded by Senator Schodorf. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Introduction of Staff

J. G. Scott, Legislative Research Department, introduced the fiscal analyst staff of the Legislative Research Department including distribution of a listing of assignments and telephone numbers (<u>Attachment 1</u>). Jill Wolters, Revisor of Statutes Office, introduced the staff of the Revisor of Statutes Office.

Senator Emler, Chairperson, explained the committee and conferee rules for the 2010 Legislative Session (Attachment 2).

Overview of Governor's FY 2011 Budget

Duane Goossen, Secretary, Department of Administration, presented an overview of the Governor's FY 2011 Budget (<u>Attachment 3</u>). Highlights of the presentation included:

- The State is in a 4-year period of declining revenues. It is anticipated that revenues will continue to decline during FY 2011.
- Actual spending for FY 2009 totaled \$6,064.4 million, \$340.0 million below the original budget.
- The Governor's revised FY 2010 budget totals \$5,451.1 million, almost \$ billion less that the original FY 2009 budget.
- Some of the Governor's proposal's for funding the balance of the FY 2010 budget will require the Legislature's approval.
- The Governor is proposing new revenue to fund the FY 2011 budget by increasing sales tax by 1 percent for 3 years to be allocated to the State General Fund (SGF) and the Highway Fund. At the end of 3 years, the sales tax increase will be decreased by .8 percent with the remaining .2 percent to continue to be distributed to the Highway Fund.
- The Governor is also proposing an increase in the cigarette/tobacco tax rate.
- The Governor is proposing to restore the 10 percent reduction taken earlier for Medicaid in FY 2011.
- If no new revenue is approved, the FY 2010 budget will need to be reduced by \$381 million.

The Secretary noted that exempting food sales from the sales tax increase would cost the State approximately \$400 million in sales tax dollars.

Presentation on Lodging Inspections

Josh Svaty, Acting Secretary, Department of Agriculture, presented information pertaining to Lodging Inspections. Mr. Svaty explained that due to budget cuts, the agency has ceased to perform lodging inspections within the State. The agency has suggested that the inspections be done at the city or county level. It is felt that statutory authority is currently available that would allow the counties or cities to perform the inspections and levy funds to cover the expense. Mr. Svaty noted that the lodging inspections are an important part of public health.

Responding to questions from the Committee, Mr. Svaty stated that the inspections could include bed and breakfast establishments. The suspension of the inspections by the Department of Agriculture would save the agency approximately \$245,000 in FY 2010. Mr. Svaty noted that the program is also suspended for FY 2011.

• The Committee requested that the agency have their attorney review the appropriate statute and report back to the Committee. If necessary, the Committee would request an attorney general opinion.

Adjournment

The next meeting is scheduled for January 13, 2010.

- 1. Committee meetings will begin promptly at 10:30 a.m. in room 548-S.
- 2. The Committee meets Monday through Friday. Meetings are scheduled for a **minimum** of one and one-half hours.
- 3. NO food shall be consumed in the committee room unless approved in advance by the Chairman. Beverages are permitted in the Senate and staff areas, but anyone who spills a beverage is responsible for cleaning the spill immediately.
- 4. Subcommittee chairpersons will be provided a schedule for subcommittee hearings. Subcommittee chair secretaries will submit all agenda items to the Senate calendar. Any changes to the schedule are the responsibility of the subcommittee chair and the subcommittee chair's secretary who shall coordinate such changes with the members of the subcommittee. Notice of any changes, however, shall be submitted to the committee Chairman's chief of staff.
- 5. Subcommittee reports are due as scheduled in order for fiscal and revisor staff to complete drafting of the committee report in a timely manner for committee and floor debate.
- 6. Cellular telephones and pagers are to be set to the silent mode upon entering the committee room. Use of cellular phones is not permitted in the hearing room while the committee is in session.
- 7. All votes shall be *viva voce*, except for votes on budget bills on final action. Such final action votes on budget bills shall be by roll call.
- 8. Any senator may have his or her vote recorded in the minutes by requesting such vote be recorded. The Chairman shall grant all such requests.
- 9. A motion to table a matter is not debatable. If the motion is passed, discussion on the issue is terminated.
- 10. No conferee shall be interrupted during such conferee's pres permission of the Chairman. Senat

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- 11. Conferees shall only be questioned about the matter under discussion by the committee.
- 12. Committee members shall not be approached by anyone during committee hearings or discussion, except other legislators or member of legislative staff.
- 13. No senator shall interrupt another senator or conferee who is speaking.
- 14. Committee members will bring bill drafts for introduction that have a RS#. Exceptions must be brought to the Chairman's attention, prior to start of the committee meeting.
- 15. All powers, duties and responsibilities not otherwise set forth herein are reserved to the Chairman.

Readers of *The FY 2011 Governor's Budget Report* can access this information on the Kansas Division of the Budget's website at http://budget.ks.gov.

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Kansas, like almost all states, faces an extremely difficult financial challenge for the coming budget year. As a result of the national recession, State General Fund revenue collections are forecast to drop for a fourth year in a row. Even after dramatic spending reductions over the last year, the FY 2011 budget cannot be balanced without even deeper cuts or increases to revenue.

In this context, Governor Parkinson presents a revised budget for FY 2010 and a balanced FY 2011 budget.

FY 2009. The original budget adopted for FY 2009 totaled \$6,404.4 million. However, during the first part of the fiscal year, the Kansas economy went into recession, and revenue collections began dropping, causing the FY 2009 budget to be revised and reduced during the 2009 Legislative Session. Actual spending for the fiscal year totaled \$6,064.4 million, \$340.0 million below the original budget.

FY 2010. The first budget passed for FY 2010 totaled \$5,613.6 million. However, revenue collections continued to decline, and by the start of the fiscal year the approved budget was out of balance even though it had been reduced \$462.1 million from the year before. On July 2, the Governor announced a plan that rebalanced the budget with \$160.0 million spending cuts and some transfers. In early November, a new Consensus Revenue Estimate revised revenue expectations downward even further, and the Governor

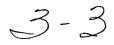
rebalanced the budget with \$231.6 million spending cuts and some transfers from other funds. The Governor's revised FY 2010 budget totals \$5,451.1 million, almost \$1 billion less than the original FY 2009 budget. Most of the revised FY 2010 budget has been put in place through allotment authority, but a few items must be authorized by the 2010 Legislature. The Governor requests the Legislature complete work on these remaining items early in the session.

FY 2011. Continued revenue drops plus increased expenditure requirements make the FY 2011 budget even more difficult. The Consensus Revenue Estimate for FY 2011 declines \$122.2 million from FY 2010. Further, human service caseload estimates, the required KPERS rate increase, the resumption of debt service payments and payments to the KPERS Death and Disability Fund, and the replacement of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds, require \$381.5 million more than FY 2010 just to maintain services and programs at the present level.

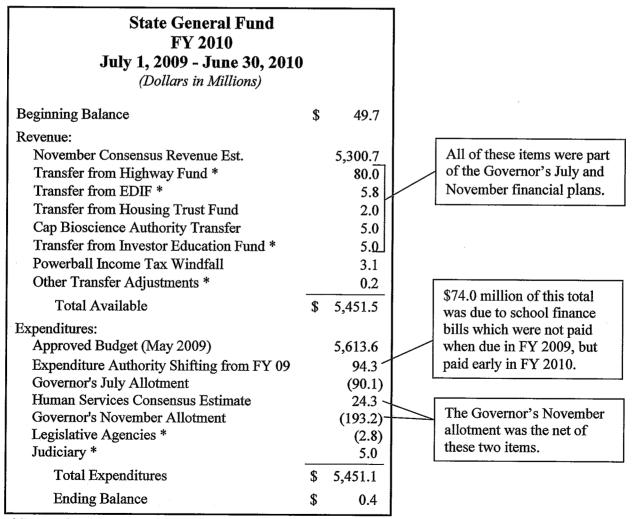
In order to meet these challenges, the Governor recommends additional spending reductions, an increase to revenue by raising the cigarette and tobacco tax rates, temporarily raising the sales tax and stopping some transfers from the State General Fund and increasing other transfers in. While most of the budget reductions currently in place must remain, the Governor's revenue proposals make it possible to avoid even further budget reductions. It also will allow for some prior cuts to be partially restored, such as Medicaid provider rates, a \$50 Base State Aid per Pupil increase in school finance, and \$10.0 million for higher education. Without the revenue increases, crippling cuts will be applied to all areas of the budget.

All Funding Sources

From all funding sources, actual spending in FY 2009 totaled \$13,960.3 million, then rises to \$14,497.2 million in the Governor's revised FY 2010 budget, and then drops to \$13,726.1 million for FY 2011. Two factors, a substantial increase in unemployment benefits and federal ARRA funds cycling through the budget, explain the expenditure rise in FY 2010 and the drop in FY 2011.

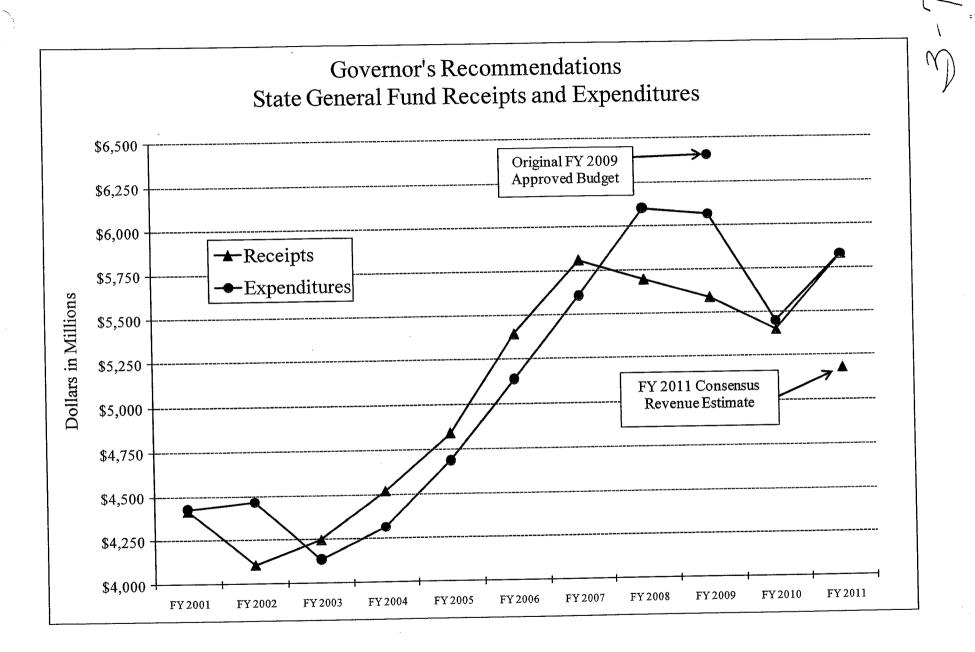
