Subject: Support for HB2205

Dear Representative Hawkins,

I am writing today as the President of the National Meningitis Association (NMA), a non-profit organization whose mission is to raise awareness about bacterial meningitis and its prevention. Everyone involved in our organization has personally suffered from this disease. I am also writing as a parent whose son died from bacterial meningitis, because we did not know about available vaccines.

I strongly support House Bill HB2205 requiring Meningitis Vaccinations for students, two doses of the meningococcal conjugate vaccine, in middle school and high school, in accordance with CDC recommendations. It is also important that students and their parents be educated about the two different meningitis vaccines that are needed to cover the meningococcal meningitis serogroups. In 2014 vaccines were licensed to protect against serogroup B meningococcal disease. This protection is not in the conjugate vaccine.

It is my hope and request that Kansas will join the many other states such as New York, Louisiana, Delaware, Missouri and Utah who have recently adopted rules or passed legislation requiring meningococcal vaccine(s), or education about vaccine-preventable diseases. This is a link to meningococcal legislation/mandates currently in existence. It would be wonderful to add Kansas to this list.
