Chairman Campbell:

Thank you for the opportunity to address the committee.

The majority of this bill will create an educational funding system that will provide students across Kansas with a quality education and I am here today largely in support of this bill. I am, however, very concerned with the section which addresses funding for at-risk and high density at-risk students. My district has a substantial number of at-risk students and our calculations are that this provision would cause a reduction of \$5.7 million dollars in at-risk funding in our district during the third year of implementation under this bill.

The reason for this loss of funding is the switch to using U.S. Census Bureau poverty data instead of using eligibility for the national school lunch program (NSLP) data to identify our at-risk students. I understand that there is concern from some legislators about the accuracy of the NSLP data, however there are also significant concerns about data from the Census.

The results of the 2010 Census reported the population of Garden City as 26,658 people and these results were disputed almost immediately by the City of Garden City. Please note Exhibit A, as attached to this testimony, a letter from then Mayor John Doll (now Senator Doll), dated July 12, 2011. This letter is part of the U.S. Census Bureau's formal appeal process, where the City of Garden City alleges an undercount in the Census from 1,342 people to 3,642. One specific neighborhood is noteworthy in the process, it is East Garden Village, a mobile home park with 667 lots. Exhibit B, provided by the City of Garden City, illustrates four blocks in this neighborhood where the original census count report zero housing units and zero residents. After exhausting the appeal opportunities in the process, the Census Bureau revised their count to 5 housing units with 16 people. Using active utility account data, the City of Garden City demonstrates there are 126 housing units and estimates 411 residents. Today, the City of Garden City contends that the final Census data under reported the population of East Garden village by 844 persons. Using school district enrollment data, we have 446 K-12 students who live in this area and 94% of these students qualify for the NSLP. I believe these facts illustrate that Census data does not accurately report poverty rate in our community.

USD 457 serves approximately 7700 students. Forty-nine percent of our students qualify as English Language Learners and we have more than 35 different languages spoken in our schools. More than 60 percent of our students qualify for free lunch under the NSLP. The current at-risk budget for USD is approximately \$10 million. In that budget, over \$9.8 million is allocated to direct costs for employees, less than \$150,000 is allocated for supplies or consumable materials. The employee costs in this budget pay for services provided to our neediest students, including salaries for reading interventionists at all levels; supporting general education classrooms to keep class sizes manageable; night school and semester school at Garden City High School; the JROTC program at GCHS; AVID tutoring; teachers and administrative support at the Garden City Alternate Education Center; and half of the cost for all-day kindergarten.

Additional at-risk funding would be used in our district to expand learning opportunities for our most struggling learners. Programs that have been cut in the past due to funding, such as summer school, could be restored. New evidence-based and research-based programs such as academically focused after-school programs would make a significant impact on the achievement of our at-risk students.

The change to Census poverty data will have a negative effect on all of the poorest districts in the state. Please reference Exhibit C, a spreadsheet sent to me by KSDE, but originally provided to legislators, which identifies the FY15 and FY17 NSLP data along with current Census Department poverty rates for each district. I have added a column that divides the FY17 NSLP data with the Census poverty rate. Since the proposed formula multiplies the Census poverty rate by 2, any result in this column greater than 2 would indicate a reduction in at-risk funding (a result of 4 would indicate a reduction of 50% of at-risk funding). I have also sorted the spreadsheet, based on the FY17 NSLP data, in order from highest poverty rates to lowest. Please note that of the 30 districts with the highest poverty rates, twenty-nine of them will see a reduction, most will see a considerable reduction, in their at-risk funding using the Census poverty data.

I appeal to you to amend this bill to continue with the current method of determining at-risk for all years. I also suggest some alternatives if that is not possible:

- 1) Allow an option of a) using the Census poverty data times 2 and then averaged with the district NSLP data OR b) using the Direct Certification rate times 2 then averaged with the district NSLP data.
- 2) Continue to determine High Density At-Risk funding using the NSLP data.

Dear Program Coordinator:

Attached is the requested documentation to support a challenge by the City of Garden City, Kansas to the 2010 Census population counts of housing units and group quarters.

Upon review of the Census Block unit counts, the staff of the City of Garden City has identified several areas within the City limits that we believe were miscounted during the 2010 Census including a trailer park, several apartment buildings, three nursing homes and several Group Quarters which should qualify for a Coverage Challenge through the Count Question Resolution Program. To my knowledge and the knowledge of the City Staff, these addresses existed and could be lived in on April 1, 2010.

- 1. <u>Tract 9605.08</u>, <u>Blocks 20000-2036</u>: a trailer park commonly known as East Garden Village, labeled with Map Spot Numbers 1-667.
- 2. <u>Tract 9605.05</u>, <u>Block 1050</u>: A two building apartment complex with 9 units on the southwest corner of the block. Map Spot Numbers 668-676.
- 3. <u>Tract 9605.05</u>, <u>Blocks 1017</u>, <u>1018</u>, <u>and 1081</u>: These Blocks all contain lots with multiple unit housing in buildings that appear to be a single unit which may have caused the counting errors we believe are associated with these blocks. Map Spot Numbers 677-714.
- 4. Tract 9606.00, Blocks 3000, 3018, 4007, 4009: These Blocks also contain lots with multiple unit housing in buildings that appear to be a single unit as well as some somewhat hard to find units accessible only via alleyways. The unique locations of some of these units may have contributed to counting errors. Map Spot Numbers 715-780 and 845-862.
- 5. Tract 9602.00, Blocks 2021, 3032, and 2019: These Blocks contain both multiple unit housing in buildings that appear to be single units as well as some fairly densely packed apartment complex units which may have lead to confusing a multiple unit building for a single unit building. Map Spot Numbers 781-842.
- 6. <u>Tract 9604.04</u>, <u>Blocks 2026</u>, <u>3003</u>, <u>and 1005</u>: These Blocks contain a mix of single unit housing and high density apartment complexes which may have lead to confusing a multiple unit complex for a single unit building. Map Spot Numbers 863-1110.
- Tract 9603.00, Block 3023: 1505 East Spruce Street, Garden Valley Retirement Village. Map Spot Number 1111.
- 8. <u>Tract 9604.03</u>, <u>Blocks 1002</u>: 2313 Henderson Drive, Homestead Assisted Living. Map Spot Number 1112.
- Tract 9604.01, Block 2014: 2308 North 3rd Street, Homestead Health and Rehab. Map Spot Number 1113.
- Tract 9604.04, Blocks 1006, 3003, 3004, and 3011: Group homes for disabled citizens run by MOSIAC. Map Spot Numbers 1114-1119.
- 11. Tract 9604.03, Blocks 1020, 2004, and 1005: Group homes for disabled citizens run by MOSIAC. Map Spot Numbers 1120-1122.
- 12. Tract 9602, Block 3002 and Tract 9603.00, Block 1024: Group homes for disabled citizens run by MOSIAC. Map Spot Numbers 1123 and 1124
- 13. <u>Tract 9605.07</u>, <u>Block 1014</u>: Garden City Community College Dorms. Map Spot Numbers 1125-1127.
