## K-12 Education Budget Committee 2-14-19 Proponent Testimony HB 2150

I received the following correspondence addressing this bill from a Wichita woman. At the time of this account she was serving as a school administrator. Her education experience includes many years as a class room middle school teacher in USD 259.

"As I answered the phone in my office, I heard a frantic parent on the other end telling me that her daughter had to transfer to our school because she could not stay another minute in her present school. The reason? She was being bullied. I calmed the mother down and told her that it was ok for her to be out of school for a couple of days until the transfer could take place.

The student's first day at our school, she would hardly look anyone in the eye, never smiling, or connecting with other students. After a day or so, her shoulders started to relax as she realized she was in a safe environment. A week later, she was walking down the hall with students, laughing, talking, and smiling. She had begun to thrive again.

This was a common occurrence that happened several times a year. Students transferred from **both** private and public schools. Some schools **recommended** that the bullied student transfer in order to **keep them safe**."

Colleagues, as we consider this bill, on the important subject of bullying in the lives of young Kansans', I call the committee to **think first** of the bullied child and their family or support system. We must not leave a single Kansas student in an environment where they are failing to flourish. Might this give them hope that they can feel safe again, and change their dreams into reality?

In Super Bowl 52, Toyota unveiled an advertisement with the slogan, "When we are free to move, anything is possible". This bill simply says – shouldn't this be true for a Kansas student trapped in an environment of bullying? Let's put children first and pass this compassionate measure.

HB Bill 2150 would allow more choices for parents to consider when finding a safe environment for their child. Please consider and pass HB 2150.
