Please accept this written testimony in support of HB2525. As a longtime advocate for children and the current Board President for The Family Resource Center and former sixteen-year member of the Pittsburg Community School's Board of Education, I wholeheartedly support this bill.

The intent of the Child Support program to mandate child support as a requirement for food and child care assistance eligibility and school enrolled criteria is well meaning in trying hold adults accountable for their basic responsibilities for their children.
