Bettor Restrictions	 The restriction on gambling at a casino or racetrack by family members and people residing in the same household as a casino manager, employee, or contractor is removed. The relative may place a wager with an unaffiliated casino manager or platform. 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Sports Wagering Receipts Fund	 The Sports Wagering Receipts Fund is created for the weekly collection of wagering revenues from each sports wagering manager. Separate accounts will be maintained for each manager within the Fund. Negative sports wagering revenues for a reporting period may be carried over and offset revenues in subsequent periods. Each week the Executive Director will certify the amounts to be transferred from the Fund to the Lottery Operating Fund as the State's contractual portion of the revenues. Each month the Executive Director will certify the amounts to be paid out of the Fund to the sports wagering managers as the managers' contractual portion of the revenues. Problem Gambling and Addictions Grant Fund	 Receives 2% of all sports wagering revenues.
