SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON SENATE BILL NO. 283

As Amended by Senate Committee of the Whole

Brief*

SB 283, as amended, would amend law regarding the governmental response to the COVID-19 pandemic in Kansas.

Telemedicine

In the statute authorizing the use of telemedicine, the bill would amend a provision allowing an out-of-state physician to practice telemedicine to treat Kansas patients, to replace a requirement that such physician notify the State Board of Healing Arts (Board) and meet certain conditions with a requirement that the physician hold a temporary emergency license granted by the Board. The expiration date of this section also would be extended for one year, from March 31 2021, until March 31, 2022.

Temporary Licensure

The bill would amend a statute allowing the Board to grant temporary emergency licenses to practice the professions overseen by the Board to add a provision allowing an applicant to practice in Kansas pursuant to such license upon submission of a non-resident health care provider certification form to the Kansas Health Care Stabilization Fund and without paying the annual premium surcharge required by the Health Care Provider Insurance Availability Act. The bill also would extend the expiration of

this statute for one year, from March 31, 2021, until March 31, 2022.

Business Immunity Extension

The bill would amend the COVID-19 Response and Reopening for Business Liability Protection Act to extend the expiration date of the statute governing COVID-19 claim immunity for persons or agents of persons conducting business in the state by one year, until March 31, 2022.

Expiration of Other Provisions

The bill would amend a statute regarding hospital facility usage for COVID-19 purposes to change its expiration to March 31, 2022, from 120 calendar days after the expiration or termination of the COVID-19 state of disaster emergency proclamation.

The bill would amend a statute regarding immunity for health care providers related to COVID-19 to add an expiration date of March 31, 2022.

The bill would amend a provision regarding critical access hospital bed limits to extend its expiration from June 30, 2021, until March 31, 2022.

The bill would be in effect upon publication in the *Kansas Register*.

Background

The bill was introduced by the Senate Committee on Federal and State Affairs by Senator Petersen at the request of the Kansas Chamber. As introduced, the bill would have removed the March 31, 2021, expiration date included in the statute governing business liability and changed the retroactivity provision applicable to claims under the statute.

Senate Committee on Judiciary

In the Senate Committee hearing on March 2, 2021, a representative of the Kansas Chamber testified as a **proponent** of the bill. Written-only **proponent** testimony was provided by a representative of the American Property Casualty Insurance Association. No other testimony was provided.

On March 2, 2021, the Senate Committee adopted an amendment to extend the March 31, 2021, expiration date to March 31, 2022, and to remove the change to the retroactivity of such claims.

Senate Committee of the Whole

On March 3, 2021, the Senate Committee of the Whole adopted amendments regarding telemedicine, temporary licensure of professions overseen by the Board, and the expiration dates of other COVID-19-related statutes and provisions.

Fiscal Information

No fiscal note was available when the Senate Committee or Senate Committee of the Whole took action on the bill.
