SB128 – Ad Astra Opportunity Tax Credit Proponent Testimony Oral In-Person With Written Testimony

Honorable Chairman Tyson, Vice-Chair Peck, Ranking Minority Leader Holland, and Committee Members:

Good morning. I am thankful for this opportunity to speak on behalf of an issue that I care about in this public forum. Senate Bill 128 should be adopted.

That the State of KS supports & encourages homeschoolers is so important. We have in the state and ideal situation for homeschoolers—little to no regulation. This bill doesn't come with any red tape or potential red tape. We all know that money given comes with regulations, audits, oversight, etc. Putting people's money that they are already paying in the form of state taxes back into their own hands might be the push more families need to do what we did. Parents decide what is important to them and can use the credit however they choose.

Edu. Savings Accounts sound like they might work for certain types of schools, and might even give the public schools some much-needed competition. There are other bills about scholarships. That works-for those who qualify. I believe the best way to continue to encourage homeschooling without taking away freedom, is a simple tax credit and that is why I came today and am supporting Senate Bill128.

Since 2010, I have been grateful many times for KS homeschool 'regulations' or lack of them. Kansas by design has a 'hands off' approach to homeschooling that benefits everyone. We can be proud of our lack of regulation. Freedom works.
