

Senate Bill 12
Proponent Testimony
Senator Mike Thompson

Chairwoman Gossage and members of the committee,

I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 12.

There are some decisions in life that are so consequential that society, out of compassion and love, must step in to protect those who may make those decisions prematurely.

In fact, decisions of that magnitude are so potentially life-altering, that we prosecute adults who contribute to dangerous choices that underage persons make. Preventing the drinking of hard liquor under the age of 21 is one example, and so we write laws to protect those individuals from their own lack of judgment and the bad judgement of adults who encourage or promote that harmful behavior.

Similarly, Senate Bill 12 protects young Kansans from mutilating, irreversible, toxic, and life threatening, surgical, medical, and chemical procedures that are employed to ostensibly change their gender. These procedures are essentially experimentation on young healthy people who frequently become permanent medical patients because of these interventions.

The life-altering decision to accede to gender reassignment protocols should <u>only</u> be made by the individual who will suffer the long-term consequences of their course of action. They must be made at an age where they can fully understand the risks, and take full responsibility for, the impact of their own choices. Their final determination should be made independent of the influence or coercion of others. They must be able to live with their decision and realize that no one else will be to blame for the outcome.

What is the age at which we should allow young people to independently conclude that they should proceed with these types of procedures? Consider this:

- The Federal government allows young people to remain on their parent's insurance up to age 26.
- The human brain is not fully developed until the mid-20s.
- We disallow drinking alcohol under age 18, and hard liquor consumption for those under 21.
